Easy Hot Cross Buns
Broadcast: March 10, 1951
1 1/2 cups biscuit mix 5 tablespoons
2 teaspoons sugar Pet Milk
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1/4 cup water
1/4 cup seedless raisins 3 tablespoons brown sugar

Put into bowl biscuit mix, sugar, cinnamon and raisins. Stir in with fork a mixture of 4 tablesp. milk and the water. Turn out on lightly floured board. Knead a few seconds or until smooth. Roll 1/2 in. thick. Cut into 8 rounds with floured 2 1/2-in. cutter. With back of knife press a cross about half way through each round. Place close together in greased 8-in. round cake pan. Brush tops with rest of milk. Fill crosses with brown sugar. Bake in very hot oven (450) 15 min., or until brown.
