

Matheson lists the following soybeans: (1) Prepare land well and kill as much grass and weeds ill for the past week at his home, as possible before planting, (2) be sure to use lime at the rate of Mr. and Mrs. Marion Clark and 1 to 2 tons per acre on land that fertilizer, (4) use Roanoke variety Mrs. J. 
