## Ensign Is Appointed New Member Of Orange County Welfare Board

The Rev. John E. Ensign has been appointed as the third member of the Orange County Board of Public Welfare by the State Board of Welfare.

Mr. Ensign is pastor of the New Hope Presbyterian Church and manager of Camp New Hope, located between Hillsboro and Chapel Hill.

He succeeds Grady A. Brown, who was not eligible for reappointment and joins Henry Hogan and Joe Howard to complete the new board.

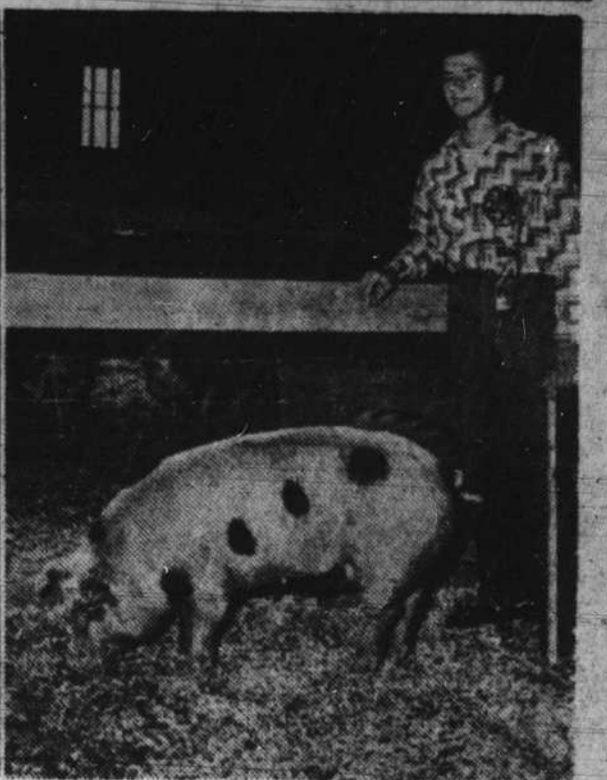
Each county in the State has a three-member board and the State Board of Welfare is empowered to name one of the three members.

Ensign's term will be for three years.

Frank A. Daniels, chairman of the State Board of Welfare, in announcing the appointment of the entire list for the State said that the State Board, in appointing the new members, had searched for "civic-minded, socially-conscious citizens" who were willing to accept the increasing responsibility being carried by county welfare boards under the state's plan for a locally-administered public welfare program. "We believe that every one of the persons we have appointed to these boards is an excellent choice," he emphasized.

"We took into account the recommendations of private citizens, county and city officials, and state legislators, and each person recommended was carefully considered. We are sure that the state's welfare program, at the local level, will be in good hands and that every effort will be made to provide efficient welfare services directed toward meeting carefully investigated need and toward helping people to help themselves. The large degree of local responsibility for financing and administering the program keeps the public welfare program close to the citizens of every county."

In explaining the procedure used in making the selections, the State Board chairman said that that group names members to the 100 boards every three years, under a staggered-term plan. A second member of each county board is named by the county commissioners, and the third member is named by the first two appointees. No board member can serve more than two consecutive terms.



## Orange 4-H Club Takes Top Honors At Fat Stock Show

For the third year in succession Orange County club members have taken top honors in the swine division at the Fat Stock Show in Durham. The honor this year went to Oliver Roberts of the Hillsboro 4-H Club who exhibited a Spotted Poland China barrow. The reserve champion went to Carl Walters, of Aycock Club, who also exhibited a Spotted Poland China barrow.

This is the third year that Carl Walters has won second place honors in the show. Young Roberts received 80c per lb. for his 215 lb. barrow. The animal was bought by the Piedmont Packing Company of Hillsboro. As an additional prize, the Orange County SPC Breeders Association will award him a young gilt. Piedmont Packing Company also bought the Reserve Champion belonging to Carl Walters at 36c per lb. Of the 46 hogs in the show, Orange County Club members exhibited 37. Twenty-five of these were awarded blue ribbons, 11 red ribbons, and 1 white ribbon. A very high compliment was given by the judge, Dr. H. A. Stewart, of State College, who said that this group of top hogs would compare very favorably with groups of top hogs exhibited at the International Livestock Exhibition at Chicago.

Four-H and FFA members exhibiting fat hogs were as follows: Benney Pittman, Oliver Roberts, Pat Martin, Jerry Garrard, Jack Holloway, Mildred Ferrell, Carl Walters, Van Kenion, Frank Miller, Henry Morris, Betty and Rose Walters, Jimmy Dunn, Troy Thompson, and Thomas Teer. The average price for all hogs was \$23.10 per 100 lbs. (including the grand and reserve champions).

In the swine breeding division of the show, the Orange County exhibit was sponsored by the Orange County SPC Breeders Association. Nineteen animals were entered by the local 4-H and adult breeders in this event. In the Junior gilt class, Jimmy Dunn, Hillsboro 4-H Club member, had the grand champion, with R. E. Poythress, Route 3, Chapel Hill, exhibiting the reserve champion. In the senior gilt class, R. L. Mohler of Hillsboro was awarded first place. ## Town Elections Next Tuesday

Tuesday will be election day in Orange County for residents of the three incorporated towns, Chapel Hill, Hillsboro, and Carrboro. In Chapel Hill, interest centers around the contests for Aldermen and Judge, since Mayor Edwin S. Laner is without opposition. Six persons, including one Negro, are seeking three vacant seats on the Board, and two are seeking the municipal judgeship.

Last night candidates expressed their views and answered questions at a public meeting sponsored by the League of Women Voters.

The candidates are: P. L. Burch and G. Obie Davis, incumbents, O. K. Cornwell, Giles Horne and Fred Edwards, for the Aldermanic vacancies; William S. Stewart and Paul Robertson for the bench. In Carrboro, Dr. J. Sullivan Gibson is opposing Mayor I. F. Hardee for Mayor. Candidates for commissioner include the incumbents, D. M. Ray, Roy Riggsbee, P. L. Senter, A. B. "Mack" Poole; and new candidates, Sidney Barker, Roy Lloyd, O. M. Powers, and W. M. Lackey.

In Hillsboro, there is no contest and a token vote will elect Mayor Ben Johnston, and Commissioners, V. M. Forrest, W. M. Chance, R. J. Smith, Dr. H. W. Moore and F. E. Joyner, who are unopposed for the six positions.

## H. D. Club Week Being Observed

Hillsboro — For 443 members of 17 county home demonstration clubs this is National Home Demonstration Week — a week in which the theme "Today's Home Builds Tomorrow's World" will be used in all phases of club work and play.

The Spring Federation meeting for the county was held yesterday as a part of the week's observance. Mrs. Kenneth Cuyler of Durham, a delegate to the International meeting of Farm Women in Denmark last year, told about her experiences in Europe and showed slides of her trip. Refreshments were served by the Schley and Smith Level Clubs and music was furnished by the County choral group. Mrs. Paul Long, county council president, presided.

In the organization on the county level there is two white home demonstration agents, Mrs. Kathryn Hamrick and Miss Virginia Cathey, and one Negro home demonstration agent, Mrs. Bonnie Davis. Serving as voluntary leaders are 80 women trained to hold 82 meetings which were attended by 1,459 persons during the past year.

Members have accomplished work through programs planned by the home demonstration agents and the extension service at State College. The Family Life program reached into homes throughout the county as the study, "Character and How It Grows" was conducted in 17 clubs in November. A county music program was begun in 1950 with the election of Mrs. Charlie Mincey of Schley Club, as county music chairman. Each club music chairman cooperated by following a suggested outline in developing the club and county program.

The citizenship study was featured in October. Thirty-eight UN flags were made by club members and presented to schools, churches, Grange Halls, American Legion posts, the University of North Carolina and the town of Chapel Hill.

Home demonstration club members learn not only up-to-date homemaking skills to benefit their own families, but, as is seen by the county program during the past year, they carry on work for the community — by many voluntary services and cooperation with the various other agencies in the area.
