

Most important of the conditions set up by Miss Wall was that the school building shall be located somewhere between the Gra-Church and not closer to the Wall home than the church. The site originally decided on by the school authorities was a knoll between the church and the Wall Wall that she retain approximately two acres of the property to be sold to the Episcopal Church the two acres adjacent to the church were taken away.

Miss Wall suggested that the school be built in the area between the Church and Graham property on a 13% acre plot which she is willing to sell. A meeting between Miss Wall, the architect of Mrs. George Gilmore and all and the school board was held Monday but no decision was made pending the making of the contour map and consultations with the State Planning authorities.
