Homemaker Hints

SHARP KNIVES IN KITCHEN -A sharp knife is safer than a dull knife because it cuts more effectively and quickly without waste or strain-be sure to han dle it with care. Never put the knife in the dishpan as it might give you an underwater cut.

After using knife, wash it and put it in a knife compartment. You can prevent cuts by keeping all sharp kitchen tools in their

own compartments. OPENING JARS AND CANS-When opening jars or bottles, be sure that you have the right type of opener. Knives should not be

used. A good can opener is one that makes a clean, smooth cut. The wall type which has a wide spread is excellent. However, to prevent bumping yourself, be sure to use the kind that can be folded back against the wall

when not in use. BROKEN GLASS - When you've broken glass, first sweep up the larges tpices into a dustpan and then use moist cotton to pick up each tiny particle. Dispose of both the glass and the cotton by wrapping them up in heavy paper and placing in a sate disposal container: Be sure to tie the bag before disposing of it.
