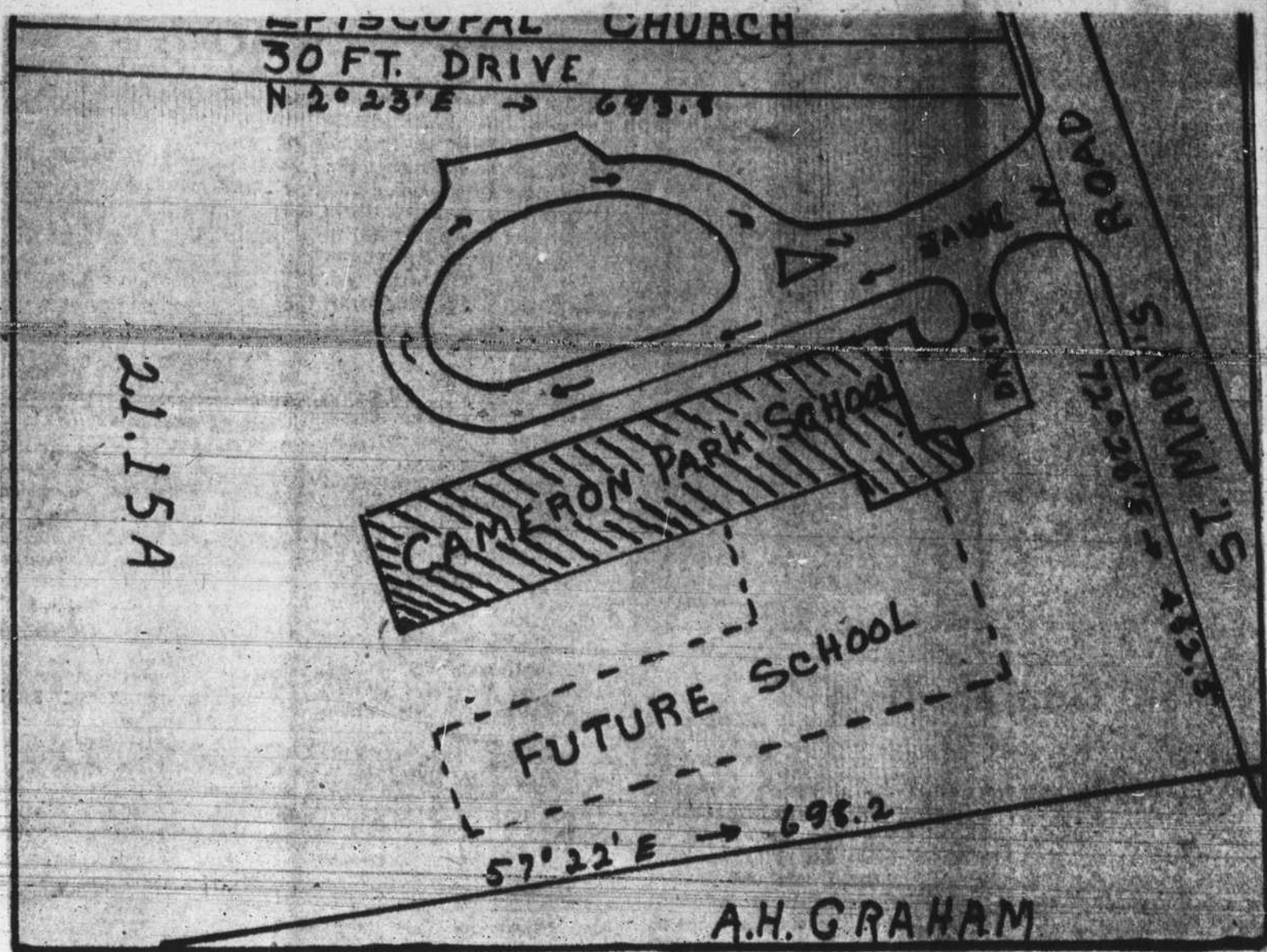


Layout For New Cameron-Park School Plant



Mrs. Campbell New Unit On St. Mary's To Head Duke To Contain 14 Classes

Fund Drive

DURHAM, N.C.—Mrs. Edgar Campbell has been named chairman of the Duke University Loyalty Fund campaign for 1954-55 in the Hillsboro area, it was announced today.

The Loyalty Fund is Duke's annual alumni giving program, through which the institution's former students contribute annually to its support.

As chairman for the area, Mrs. Campbell will head a committee that will seek to contact personally all Duke alumni who have not participated in the giving program thus far this year. The local campaign will be one of approximately 20 to be conducted throughout the country beginning February 1.

Loyalty Fund area chairmen in this region have been invited to attend a meeting at Durham on Sunday, February 27 where they will meet with representatives of the University to discuss the University's financial needs and to complete plans for the final stages of the campaign. Reports will be received at this meeting.

This is the eighth year of Duke's Loyalty Fund, and Duke President, J. Morgan Kousser, announced in January, it has been one of the most successful. He reported that nearly 5,000 alumni and friends had given more than \$145,000 on January 1. The number of friends, corporations, and organizations having in this program has increased.

Superintendent G. Paul Carr this week prepared a line drawing to clear up apparent misunderstanding regarding the exact location of the new Cameron Park School in Hillsboro and the orientation of the proposed building on the property purchased nearly two years ago from Miss Rebecca Wall.

The building, excavation on which has already been started by the contractor, will be set 100 feet from St. Mary's Road and the long part of the building will face the property of St. Matthews Episcopal Church to the west.

The building will consist of 14 classrooms, a lunchroom with kitchen and dining space for 300 to 400 children, offices, health room and storage room.

Twelve of the 14 classrooms to be built now as part of the original wing of the structure which will be expanded in the future as required will be permanent classrooms, each a self-contained unit with toilet and other facilities in each in accordance with the latest plans for schools for the little children. Another wing, as shown in the layout above, can be built later, as needs require.

The building itself will be 350 feet long with double loaded corridors. The Herman Nelson unit heating system, the latest type of school heating, will be used in the new school.

Exchange Club Plans Crime Week Program

National Crime Prevention Week will be observed in Hillsboro this year from February 13-19, according to Wilson Cole, president of the Exchange Club of Hillsboro. The local group is cooperating with The National Exchange Club in this 8th annual observance.

President Cole will announce a general chairman and committees next week.

Quoting recently released statistics, Mr. Cole said, "I'm sure if the citizens of this community know that authorities expect over two million crimes to be committed in the United States this year, over half of which will be by persons under 21, they will be more than willing to join with us in our program of crime prevention. We have chosen juvenile delinquency to be the target of our 1955 activities, a theme in which every parent should be interested."

"Top level government officials are cooperating with the Exchange Clubs over the nation during National Crime Prevention Week to alert the American people to the increasing menace of crime," he said.

The Exchange Club each year sponsors some event with all proceeds going to the Polio Fund. Last year the Woody Mashburn Talent Show realized about \$235 in prior years comedy basketball and other events have realized similar amounts.

This year all proceeds of the dance, including the concessions, will go to this very worthy cause. Advance tickets will be on sale by the members of the Exchange Club. The price of tickets is \$1.00 each for adult couples or stag and 75 cents each for student couples or stag.

Board Studies Plans For Dam; Prepares For Bond Issue Vote

\$39,000 Dam To Give 100 Days Reserve

The town board of Hillsboro studied today the plan for providing adequate water storage facilities to prevent another severe shortage such as was experienced last summer.

Last Thursday afternoon the board heard recommendations from Engineer Tom Rose of Chapel Hill on the construction of a dam at the site of the old Dimock's Mill on the Eno River above the water plant.

Yesterday Attorney Paul Ranson of the firm of Graham & Ranson, town attorneys, conferred with the Local Government Commission relative to the procedure for issuing bonds to pay for the construction of a dam.

The amount of money to be sought and the date for an election to obtain permission of the people for issuing the bonds have not yet been decided.

Mr. Rose estimated that a dam which would store about 20,000,000 gallons of water and provide a supply of 100 days at the current rate of usage without rainfall could be built for approximately \$39,000, including clearing the land, excavations and construction. Flash boards would be erected at the top of the main dam and add 50 per cent more capacity to the lake, according to Mr. Rose.

Proposed to the Board was a cavity type concrete masonry dam with top of the spillway at elevation 515.0, the same elevation as the old rock dam previously at the site. At the assumed rock elevation in the foundation, the dam will be 17 feet high at the spillway and 22 feet high at the buttresses. The spillway will be nine feet below the level of the road near the dam. The spillway will have a length of 110 feet and depth of five and will pass a flood of 4800 cu. ft. per second. The highest recorded flood during a 10-year period of U. S. Government measurement from 1926 to 1936 was 4,650 cu. ft. per second in October 1929.

This dam, according to the engineer's estimates, will produce a lake that will back water up the Eno River for a distance of 6,500 feet or 1 1/2 miles above the dam and about the same distance up Seven Mile Creek. It will be a long, narrow lake, not spreading beyond the confines of the present river gorge. It will store, according to estimates, 24,000,000 gallons of water. At the present use of water it will provide a supply for 100 days without any rainfall.

Dog Takes French Leave After Misting At Mayor's Office

The case of the missing fyce watch dog is still unsolved. Chief Tom Roberts of Hillsboro apparently lost one of his chief helpers, the town lost a plate glass window at the Mayor's office and the town hall frequenter Charlie Franklin got the scare of his life in the event which took place Saturday night.

Franklin got up to leave the hall and accidentally stepped on the sleeping dog's foot, lost his balance and fell into the plate glass window. The window was shattered as it fell to the cement and the dog made a hasty retreat.

By late yesterday, the town had replaced the plate glass window, Franklin had recovered his equilibrium, but Mr. Tom had not found the missing late-hour companion. The fyce had not been seen or heard from since the Saturday night episode.

Orange County schools will operate the next two Saturdays to partially make up for time lost.

County Superintendent G. Paul Carr made this announcement yesterday and urged the cooperation of all students and parents in this effort to close school at the normal time next June.

Schools in the county thus far have been closed for four days because of snow and attendant road problems. Earlier at the beginning of the term local schools operated on a short schedule for several weeks as a result of the acute water shortage.

A short schedule will be observed on Saturday, according to Superintendent Carr.

In the event there are no other losses for the remainder of the term and two days are made up with Saturday classes, county schools will close on June 3, according to the superintendent. The current plan to hold Saturday classes is an effort on the part of officials to cooperate with parents of the rural areas where children are needed at home when the Spring growing season gets underway.

Mrs. Mary Carr Wildcats Get Passes At 79 Win; Escape Cellar Spot

Mrs. Mary E. Carr, wife of J. A. Carr of Hillsboro, died at her home on Highway 70-A yesterday morning at 4:45 o'clock following an extended illness.

She was 79 years of age. Funeral services will be held at the First Baptist Church, Hillsboro, this morning at 11 o'clock with the Rev. Charles Maddry, the Rev. J. R. Green and the Rev. R. Frederick officiating. Burial will follow in Hillsboro cemetery.

Mrs. Carr was the daughter of the late George W. and Eliza Rieckel of Orange County. Survivors in addition to her husband included one son, B. S. Carr of Hillsboro, three grandchildren and one great grandchild, two brothers, Johnny Terrell of Mebane and Joe Terrell of Haw River; one sister, Mrs. Minnie Gillespie of Haw River.

Hillsboro High's Wildcats leaped from behind in the second half to escape the Eastern Class AA District Three cellar with a 30-49 triumph over Methodist Orphanage of Raleigh here on Tuesday night.

Neither team had scored a District Three victory, being tied for best place in the standings with 0-4 records.

Bill Dickey with 14 and Billy Joe Hicks with 10 were high for Hillsboro. Jim Newton paced the Orphanage five with 16 points. In the girls' game Joan Forrest made 32 points to spark Hillsboro to a 59-34 victory. Dolly Strayhorn came in with 13 points. The Hillsboro teams play at Graham tomorrow night.
