17 Taxpayers Complain About Values To Board

The Board of Commissioners heard complaints from 17 taxpayers seeking reductions Monday, while sitting as a board of equalization and review.

An even dozen of the complaints came from the more populous Chapel Hill township.

In two cases, regarding valuations placed on property of N. C. Theaters, Inc. and the Texas Company on its service station at the corner of Franklin and Columbia Streets, the commissioners declined to change previously placed values.

The N. C. Theaters complaint involved only the valuation placed on its air conditioning system which had a tax value of \$28,080. The service station owners next door claimed the \$35,040 appraised value of their building was too high and contended it should be \$27,000.

In other cases the commissioners agreed to inspect the property for comparison with similar property before finally acting on the complaints. Yesterday afternoon the board began a tour of the property to be studied in the Chapel Hill area.
