Seek 2,000 Names...

Jaycees Are Circulating Petitions On Recreation

Members of the Chapel Hill Jaycees are circulating petitions locally calling for the setting up of a recreation district in which a vote would be held on a bond issue and tax to support a public recreation program.

The petitions, to the county commissioners, ask the board to set up the Chapel Hill-Carrboro Recreation District of Orange County, and submit to a public vote the levying of (1) an annual tax of not more than \$.10 per \$100 valuation for maintaining a supervised recreation program in the district and (2) the issuance of \$250,000 in bonds to build facilities for the

recreation program. The suggested district includes Chapel Hill, Carrboro, and an unincorporated suburban area in Orange County surrounding the town of Carrboro. The petition, which is subject to change by the commissioners after public hearings on such matters.

Seeks 2,000 Signatures

Objective of the signature campaign, according to Bob Cox, chairman of this phase of the project, is to secure 2,000 names—well over the 1,000 names per cent required for the petition to be presented to the commissioners for their consideration. Cox said he hoped the petition would be ready for presentation to the commissioners after the next meeting, which might be held next fall.

Persons who wish to sign the petitions and who may be in the club's house-to-house campaign are asked to telephone Cox. He said he hoped to complete the signing-up this week. Club membership has been increased into teams in various parts of the community for the purpose of completing this step and answer questions on the recreation project, he said.
