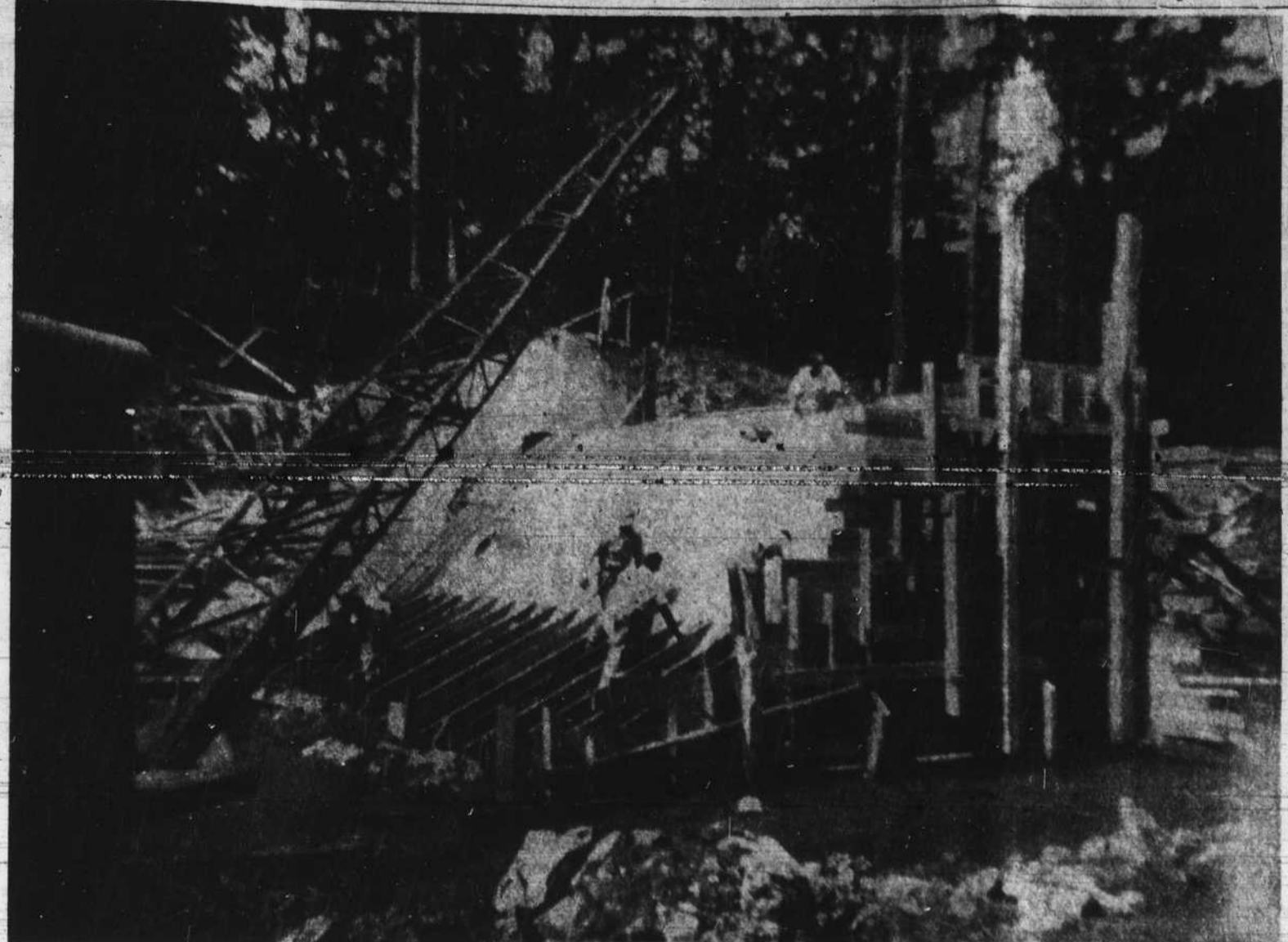

**NEW HILLSBORO DAM IN FINAL STAGES**—They began pouring concrete yesterday in the final section of the new dam being constructed on the Eno River for the Town of Hillsboro. Yesterday's pouring was a five foot depth of one half of the final section. Next, the flow of water will be rerouted and another section will be added to the concrete structure which is expected to provide the community sufficient water storage facilities for many years to come. ## Bond Hearing Held Without Protest; Gattis Reappointed

A public hearing on the County Commissioners' proposal to issue \$34,000 in bonds for school buildings passed Monday without incident.

No citizen or group representative appeared before the board either in favor or against the issuance and the Commission proceeded with the second step in the legal operation necessary to issue the bonds without a vote of the people.

Following the formal hearing on the bonds, the commissioners unanimously reelected Sam M. Gattis as tax supervisor for a new two year term ending June 30, 1957.

In order to get the newly created Orange County Agricultural and Industrial Development Commission to work, the commissioners voted unanimously to ask Don S. Matheson, one of the 28 appointees from the seven townships, to call the group into session to effect its organization in accordance with the May 2 resolution setting the body up.

## Former Local Man, Wife In Narrow Escape

A Hillsboro native and his wife recently escaped death or serious injury when a Tennessee State Highway Department road crew sprayed the car in which they were riding with tar which had been heated to 210 degrees.

He was E. W. Snipes, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Snipes of Hillsboro, who is president of a casket company in Knoxville.

"Our car had air-conditioning and we had all the windows up or two of us would have been blinded or killed," said Mr. Snipes in commenting upon the narrow escape.

Mr. and Mrs. Snipes and Dr. and Mrs. L. I. Reed were enroute to Bristol for the summer Shrine picnic when the accident occurred. "We were driving on U.S. Highway 11W just north of Rogersville when it happened," he said. "They flagged us on and just as we got beside the tar truck, the operator apparently pulled the wrong lever, shooting the hot tar all over the car," Snipes stated. "They used 55 gallons of gasoline just to clean the windows so we could see to go on to Bristol," he added. Snipes is aide to the potentate of Kerbela Temple, and Dr. Reed is past potentate of the temple.

## Local Business & Professional Women Honor Miss Sue Hayes

The Business and Professional Women's Club of Hillsboro selected Miss Sue Hayes as the local Business Women of the Year at its last meeting.

Miss Sue, as she is widely known to everyone through out the community, is not a member of the club.

A native of Hillsboro, she worked with her father, one of the pioneer druggists of the area, in the Hayes Drug Store which was first located a few yards from the corner on which the present Cornier Drug Store now stands. At his death, she took over the business and ran it with the help of licensed pharmacists for over 30 years.

She sold the drug business to B. B. "Jake" Forrest nine years ago but still handles the rental of her business property in downtown Hillsboro.

### Tributes Paid Trio For Long REA Service

County Agent Don S. Matheson cited the tremendous strides made by rural electrification in Orange County last Saturday when he presented gold watches to three long-time-directors of Piedmont Electric Membership Corporation at the annual barbecue of officers, employees, their wives and guests last Saturday afternoon.

The recipients who have each served 15 years or more on the Board of Directors without pay were W. F. Shaw, the president, J. G. Jobe and Clyde Roberts.

Prior to the presentation Matheson reminisced about the early struggles of the small group which founded the local cooperative and pointed to the fact that there were 28 miles of rural electric lines in Orange County in 1932. In 1937, he said, there were only 140 and 150 more were added by the REA during its first year of operation. The cooperative's network in Orange now totals around 600 miles.

A feature of the social event was the presentation of safe driving awards to seven employees and safe worker awards to 18 others for varying periods of non-accident working time. ### Chapel Hill Has Two-Thirds Of Increase

An increase of almost four percent in the Orange County property valuation for 1955 over the previous year was revealed yesterday by Tax Supervisor S. M. Gattis.

According to the final tabulations just recently completed, the total valuation went up from \$71,116,099 to \$73,907,767 in this year's listing, reflecting the steady construction which has been in progress throughout the county.

Two thirds of the increased valuation came from the populous Chapel Hill-Township. Of the \$2,791,668 total increase, Chapel Hill recorded \$1,872,289.
