## 25 Students At NC State From Orange

Among the 4,816 students enrolled at North Carolina State College this semester are 25 from Orange County.

Figures on the county enrollment were released today by Kenneth D. Raab, director of admissions and registration, who said North Carolinians make up 82 per cent of the student body.

The Tar Heel students representing all of the State's 100 counties total 3,959. In addition, there are 699 students from 43 other states and the District of Columbia, 153 from 38 foreign countries, and five from United States possessions.

State College has six major degree-granting schools—the Schools of Agriculture, Design, Education, Forestry, and Textiles. It is recognized as one of the nation's key Land-Grant Colleges.

## Hillsboro Kin On Last Flight Of Famed Ship

First Lieutenant Arthur L. Fox was the last navigator to guide a scheduled route flight of the C-54 "Skymaster" transport across the overocean flight paths of the Pacific Division, Military Air Transport Service, and his wife, the former Marie Russell, whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. Boyd Russell, reside in Hillsboro and the Fox's two-year-old daughter Angela E., were flying with him.

The retiring four-engined workhorses have been the mainstay aircraft in the Pacific Division, MATS, since the formal organization of the Military Air Transport Service in 1948.

Stationed at Tokyo International Airport as check navigator for the 100th Air Transport Squadron Lt. Fox and his family resided in Grant Heights near the island air-drome which serves Japan's capital city.

Lt. Fox was graduated from St. Augustine's College at Raleigh while Mrs. Fox, a registered nurse, took her cap at St. Agnes Nurses School in Raleigh. During Lt. Fox's tour of duty in the Far East, Mrs. Fox performed nursing at Tokyo General Army Hospital.

The Fox family is scheduled to report to West Palm Beach after their 30-day leave. They were to leave Mobile, Ala., yesterday where they have been visiting with Mr. and Mrs. Orlando J. Fox and are planning to arrive in Hillsboro tomorrow.

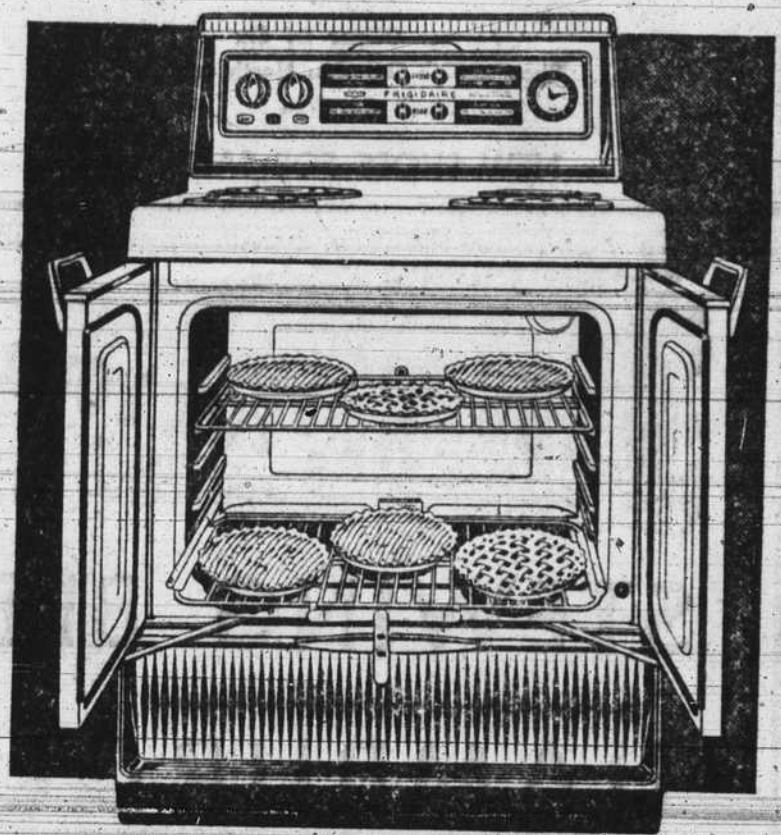
