Mayor Pledges Full Support To "S-D Day"

Pledging the full support of the town government, Mayor Ben Johnston today asked every resident of Hillsboro to join in making a success of the Nations' second annual "S-D Day"—Safe Driving Day—Thursday, December 1.

Mayor Johnston announced his appointment of John P. Ballard as S-D Day Director for Hillsboro.

The program has the endorsement of President Eisenhower, Governor Luthes Hodges, and every other Governor in the United States. It is sponsored by the President's Committee for Traffic Safety in cooperation with scores of national organizations.

The goal this year will be to cut down on traffic accidents, not only on S-D Day, itself, but for the 21-day period beginning November 21—"S-D minus 10"—and continuing through December 1—"S-D plus 10."

Mayor Johnston said: "The purpose of the S-D Day campaign is the same this year as last: To prove that we can reduce traffic accidents by our own personal actions, as motorists and pedestrians.

"Last year, S-D Day did, in fact, produce a reduction in the Nation's deaths and injuries, and in the number of accidents. This year, the urgency is even greater, because the nationwide death toll has been climbing again.

"Nobody thinks that the streets and highways can suddenly be made safe by a short campaign, building up to a special 'day.' Nor is the S-D Day program being undertaken with the idea of encouraging people to avoid accidents for a single, and then to forget safety.

"The S-D Day objective is to call attention to the necessity for sound, proven, year-around safety programs, supported — the year around — by every citizen.

"This campaign offers us the incentive to take stock of our behavior—as individuals, and as a community—in the matter of traffic safety. It is an opportunity to remind ourselves of our moral and civic responsibility for safe driving and safe walking. It is a chance to demonstrate that, if we can hold down accidents for one day, or three weeks, we can do so every day."
