

A last - minute, contest in the May 26 Democratic primary developed in the County School Board race on Saturday, moments before the Board of Elections noon-time deadline for candidates' filing. New Polling Places Chosen At 2 Precincts

The Orange County Board of Elections, meeting last Saturday morning at the courthouse, named precinct elections officials for the next two years and officially designated new polling places for two Chapel Hill precincts.

New voting places for Chapel Hill No. 2. will be at the Student Hut of the Presbyterian Church on East Rosemary and for Chapel Hill No. 3 Woollen Gymnasium on Raleigh Road. Former polling places for these precincts were the Legion Hut and the Institute of Government Barracks. The latter has been torn down and the former is expected to be within the next few weeks.

Four registrars were appointed for full two year terms for the first time; the remainder were reappointed, all having served previously and for varying period of time.
