Fred Rogers Named Principal

Clouds Budget Picture 78 Million Is Tentative Valuation

Orange County commissioners are proceeding with budget hearings in preparae tion for the adoption of the county's budget for the next fiscal year.

Meanwhile, plans are being held up and ultimate budget decisions are being delayed by New York bond attorneys who will not yet approve the sale of school bonds approved by the people of Orange County in a special bond election held late in March.

It was expected that the decision in the Anson County case by the North Carolina Supreme Court last week would open the way for the sales of bonds which were being held up throughout, the state, However, the Local Government Commission Secretary, Mr. Easterling, has advised County Accountant Sam Gattis that the New York attorneys, who must approve the bond sales, are now studying a Stanly County suit, which may also have to be disposed of before they will give approval. The attorneys have promised some decision within 48 hours as to whether bending sales will have to be postponed until the Supreme Court has acted in this case

Final budget figures and the new tax rate, of course, are tied very closely to the proposed sale of bonds for school construction.




