The County Commissioners, meeting with Orange County legislators here Monday, were offered a club they can use to flail the life out of one race track and permit another to continue operations.

And the board members, although no formal vote was taken, said they would accept the authority proffered to them by State Senator Edwin S. Lanier and Representative J. W. Umstead, as a device for handling the ticklish race track situation in this county.

After considerable discussion between the commissioners and the legislators on a proposed anti-racing measure, Representative Umstead suggested a bill which would give the County Commissioners the power to license the operation of any race track in the county, thus enabling them to set up standards which would eliminate the so-called Jalopy Race Track.

Establishment of the amateur Jalopy racing at a hastily constructed track near the Baptist Gospel Tabernacle on the Orange Grove Road was bitterly denounced by the pastor, the Rev. W. I. Conway, many of his membership, and residents of the area last summer.

At Monday's meeting, however, Senator Lanier revealed he had been given a petition bearing some 800 names opposing Sunday racing in the county and that he was "committed to helping those people get some relief" from the racing nuisance.
