New Petition Filed To Join Chapel Hill

A new petition for annexation of small contiguous area now in the Carrboro district to the Chapel Hill school district without a vote of the people has been filed with the Orange County Board of Education.

The area for which annexation is requested is the property lying on both sides of Homestead road from the point where that road leaves the Chapel Hill school district to the point where it interects with Highway 36.

No action was taken at Monday's meeting on the petition which contains 44 names, including 20 land-owners, the hoard deciding that this matter will be considered along with the whole Carrboro district assignment problem.

Also at Monday's meeting, the school board heard a delegation of Hillsboro citizens urge the leasing of Orange Speedway property for use as a high school athletic field. The board indicated sympathy with the proposal and pursuant to the board's suggestion, Superintendent G. P. Carr met Tuesday night with members of the delegation, local school officials and committee members to outline details to be included and steps to be followed in negotiating the lease.
