Requests Would Up Tax Rate 25 Cents

Some increase in the Orange County tax rate appears certain on the basis of the new fiscal-year budget up for tentative adoption, probably at next Monday's regular meeting.

But the exact point between the 72c (per \$100 valuation) rate held for the past two years and the 97c rate which would be required if all departmental requests for increases are filled is yet to be determined. Among the vital decisions still to be settled is the important schools segment of the budget which accounts for well over half of the total levy.
