rabbits, turkeys? and quail starting at 'sunrise Thanksgiving Day. Lawful season on bag limit is from sunrise on the first day to sunset on the last day of the season, Feb. 14. Sunrise-to-sunset hours apply each day of the season.

According to the game protector. hunters will be allowed a daily limit of five rabbits, and a possession limit of 10; a daily limit of one turkey, two in the season; and a daily limit of eight quail, with
