Little Opposition To Proposed Changes In State Election Laws

The Commission to revise the State Constitution and the Commission to study plans for the election of Trustees of the Greater University both made their reports to the General Assembly during the past week. These reports were of interest to a large number of people, as well as the introduction of Bills changing the election law according to the recommendations of the State Board of Elections.

The main change in the Election Laws was the change of the date of the primary. We have been holding our primary the last Saturday in May and the Bill introduced by the Chairman of the Committee on Elections and Election Laws would change that date to the last Tuesday in June. The reason give for changing the day of voting from Saturday to

work on Saturday and might be away from home on week-end trips, and thus lose out in the voting. The change from May to June was due to the fact that many of those who considered the matter thought that the primary should be a bit nearer the date of the General Election in November.

Another Bill proposed as the result of the recommendations of the State Board of Elections would spell out the procedure in the case of a tie vote in the first primary and also in case of death of a candidate just before the primary was held. There appears to be little opposition to any of these proposed changes.
