Umstead Reports

More Support For Teachers' Pay Increase Than Supposed

By JOHN W. UMSTEAD, JR. Last week there were several new Bills of importance which were introduced in either the House or Senate. These Bills are almost certain to be controversial and will take up much time.

A resolution instructing the Committee on Appropriations to increase teachers salaries 7% and salaries of other state employees 3 1/2% was sent up last Tuesday. For more than two hours this resolution was debated and on the roll-call vote the resolution lost by 25 to 23. In my opinion the resolution lost due to the fact that a number of Senators thought it was the wrong approach. To have passed the resolution would have been to strike down the committee system. Senators who will support the increased salaries for teachers and other employees voted against this resolution. The vote showed, however, that the proponents for increased salaries for teachers and state employees had more strength in the Senate than had been thought prior to the test vote.

The Committee on Roads killed the Auto Inspection Bill. The vote was close and indicated that the

Election Results Provide Minor Surprises; No Upsets

The municipal elections brought a few surprises Tuesday but generally the incumbents and predicted winners emerged victorious. In Hillsboro, 80 percent of the eligible voters went to the polls in a surprisingly close election for Mayor and five commissioners, 509 of a probable 625 eligible voters casting ballots. Mayor Ben Johnston with 278 votes emerged victorious for his 14th term over Fred S. Cates Jr., who polled 215. In the Commissioners' race, incumbents V. M. Forrest, A. W. Crabtree and Fred T. Claytor won reelection, while Herman Strayhorn and Frank H. Walker were chosen for two other seats, from a total field of eight.

For the Chapel Hill district school board, the Rev. J. R. Manley, Negro minister, led the ticket and incumbents Henry Brandis Jr., law school dean, and Grey Culbreth, long-time chairman, won reelection, from a total field of seven candidates. Sandy McClamrock, F. Eugene Stroud and Roland Giduz were elected to the Chapel Hill Board of Aldermen from a field of five, including 20-year veteran Alderman Obie Davis. At Carrboro, C. P. Ellington, Wilson Lackey and Office Durham won seats on the Town Board from a field of seven candidates. Mayor R. B. Todd of Carrboro and Mayor O. K. Cornwell of Chapel Hill were not opposed.

Legal Action Against Caswell Is Threatened

The Orange County Board of Education voted Monday to begin legal action unless the Caswell Board of Education agrees within the next 10 days to assign to Orange County next year all students from this county now enrolled in Caswell.

Negotiations between the representatives of the two school boards have been in progress for some time relative to the assignment issue which has existed since last September.

Caswell's board has agreed to abide by the State Pupil assignment law with regard to students from Orange who want to attend in Caswell in the future, but thus far has refused to reassign those pupils from the Aycock district who are now attending in Caswell.

In other actions, the board Monday approved plans for taking a school census between now and the end of school; approved a request from the Committee studying school finance to have the State Department make a buildings survey of the county system; approved plans for implementing the Driver Training Program this summer in the local high schools; received a report that the Central and Cameron Park school additions would be ready for use next Fall; and took under advisement a petition from patrons of the Murphy

Jack Childress Is Appointed New Jailer

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Childress of Route 1, Hillsboro, have been named custodians of the Orange County jail by Sheriff C. D. Knight.

Mr. Childress, a sawmill worker and resident of this county for a number of years, will succeed Deputy Sheriff W. R. Roberts as jailer about May 15 and Mrs. Childress will assume responsibility for feeding the prisoners. A salary allocation of \$2,800 per year will be divided between them.

Mr. Childress will not be a deputy sheriff, but will serve as custodian of the buildings and grounds of the two courthouses and the Agriculture building in addition to the jail.

Mr. and Mrs. Roberts who have lived at the jail for 31 years asked to be relieved to move to the home of their daughter, Mrs. Louise Clayton on Tryon street in Hillsboro. Mr. Roberts will continue to serve as a Deputy Sheriff.

Barnes Chosen Candidate For NROTC Study

ABC Policy On Profits To Stand

The Boards of Commissioners and Education stood firm on two policy decisions involving the ABC system Monday.

They were:

(1) Allocation of profits to municipalities.

(2) More pay for Chairman R. J. Smith Sr.

Chairman R. J. M. Hobbs told the commissioners a movement had begun in Chapel Hill to secure local legislation which would direct the allocation of a portion of the ABC profits to the municipalities and that he had been called on the matter by Representative John Umstead Jr. Proponents of the move were not identified.

Mr. Hobbs reiterated his opposition to diverting such funds from the county's general fund, inasmuch as approval of the control system in this county was effected without encumbrances under the general state law and all stores presently contemplated were located outside of the municipalities. Other board members voiced similar sentiment and the policy originally enunciated was continued.

With Mr. Smith abstaining, the ABC board Monday passed a resolution in effect calling upon the joint Boards of Commissioners and Education to approve compensation for Mr. Smith of \$200 per month from Feb. 15 to June 30 and \$50 per month from July 1 to Jan. 1. This in effect would revoke action of a month ago which set up \$100 per month from Feb. to July to compensate the chairman for extra work in getting the system started.

When the two boards met in joint session following lunch, the board members appeared unanimously adamant in holding their original position that the ABC Board chairman in Orange County would not be a paid manager, but would remain a member of a policy-making body. The request of the ABC board to increase the temporary compensation of the Chairman was denied. Most members spoke against any change and the vote to hold the line was unanimous.

In other actions of public interest affecting ABC operations, the ABC board decided Monday to permit the sale of fortified wines up to 20 percent in Grade A restaurants and groceries.

County Signs Agreement On Farm Program

The County Commissioners Monday approved the signing of a "memorandum of understanding" which sets down in writing the responsibilities of county boards and N. C. State College in carrying out policies of the North Carolina Agricultural Extension Service.

The memorandum was recommended by a state study group as a means of eliminating misunderstandings that might occur in the employment of new personnel and other matters.

Rules governing the responsibilities of the college and county boards will remain the same as they have been all along. The only difference is that they are written down now, whereas before they were unwritten.

The study group recommending the memorandum was appointed by Governor Hodges shortly after he first took office. Purpose of the organization is to strengthen and modernize the N. C. Extension Service.

PETITION

A petition calling upon the County Commissioners to appoint Hugh M. Wilson a constable for Bingham township was presented by Mr. Wilson Monday. The petition signed by a group of residents said they were annoyed by the presence of small speakeasies in the neighborhood which serve alcoholic beverages by the drink and by the bottle. No action was taken by the board pending consultation with the county attorney relative to its authority.

4-H Dress Revue Winners Named

Four 4-H members were singled out for top honors in the 4-H Dress Revue and Health Pageant this past Friday evening at the Hillsboro High School.

Cynthia Walker, daughter of Mrs. Harry Walker of the St. Mary's Community, won first place in the senior division of the dress

revue and will receive an expense paid trip to State 4-H Club Week in July. Rosanne Cude, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Cude, was selected junior winner and received a pair of shears. These awards and others awarded to dress revue winners were given by Belk-Leggett-Horton of Chapel Hill.
