# Use Is Asked Carrboro Officials Propose By Church

The Board of Education has been requested by Mt. Herman Baptist Church, located east of Hillsboro, to consider the rental or sale of the Purchase Of Old School Plant inal sum for use by the church, The Rev. Hayne Rivers, pastor, and W. P. Andrews appeared before the board Monday to get its attitude toward such a proposition, The building and a residence on the property will not be used for school purposes next year, as result of recent action by the board transferring the students to Came-

ron Park in Hillsbore. It was indicated the church would probably use it for Sunda School and recreational purposes. Members of the board indicated they would be agreeable to a lease agreement but if the property. sold full market value would be asked. It was suggested that pastor and the County Superinten dent attempt to work out a si factory agreement which would be approved by the Board of Edu tion and the congregation of the church

#### \$30,000 Price-Subject To Bond Issue Offered

Officials of the Town of Carrboro have proposed to purchase the now abandoned Carrboro School building and auditorium from the Board of Education for use as a Municipal Center or Town Hall.

A tentative offer of \$30,000 has been made by the Mayor and the Carrboro Board of Com missioners contingent upon ap proval of a bond issue for the purchase and necessary improvements and alterations by vote of the people.

Complete plans for developmen of the property, which has not been used for school purposes, since the end of the 1957-58 term. have not been made. Such a use for the unused school property has been hinted for some time.

The Board of Education, when confronted with the Carrboro offer Monday, seemed favorably disposed toward the idea and took action placing it in position to sell the property to Carrboro in the event a bond issue is approved. It instructed County Attorney A. H. Graham to begin necessary legal procedures to offer the Carrboro School for sale at public auction. Once the property has been offered for sale at public auction, unsatisfactory bids could be rejected and the property sold privately and by negotiation.

The price proposed by the Town of Carrboro, \$30,000, is the value of the property as appraised by a committee of local realtors co and of Collier Cobb Jr., John M. Foushee and Clyde E. Hornaday. Mayor R B Todd in his letter ubmitting the town's bid indicated the board could not call for a vote on the bond issue until the bid has been accepted and the cost of repairs determined. He estimated it would require 90 days o complete the vote after th has been accepted by the Board of Education. The old Carrboro School property was retained by the County Board of Education when the present school was transferred to the Chapel Hill administrative unit at the end of the past fiscal year. Funds thus derived from a sale would go into the county's budget. The Chapel Hill school board, however, has been consulted and according to Superintendent Joe Johnston approves the proceedings leading to the contemplated sale. The Women of the New Hope


