

Miss Iola Pritchard, food conservation and marketing specialist for the N. C. Agricultural Extension Service, says that very few cases of botulism have been reported in recent years; but precautionary measurers should always be taken

to avoid the infection. Botulism germs are spores, smaller than bacteria. They only thrive in the absence of air which makes canned food a favorable habitat. They favor a food with low acid content as most vegetables. When the spores enter the human body, they multiply and form a poison which attacks the nerves.
