Following the ceremony, Mrs. Crawford entertained at her home. A wedding trip to unannounced points will be made on Morehead Avenue in Hillsboro.

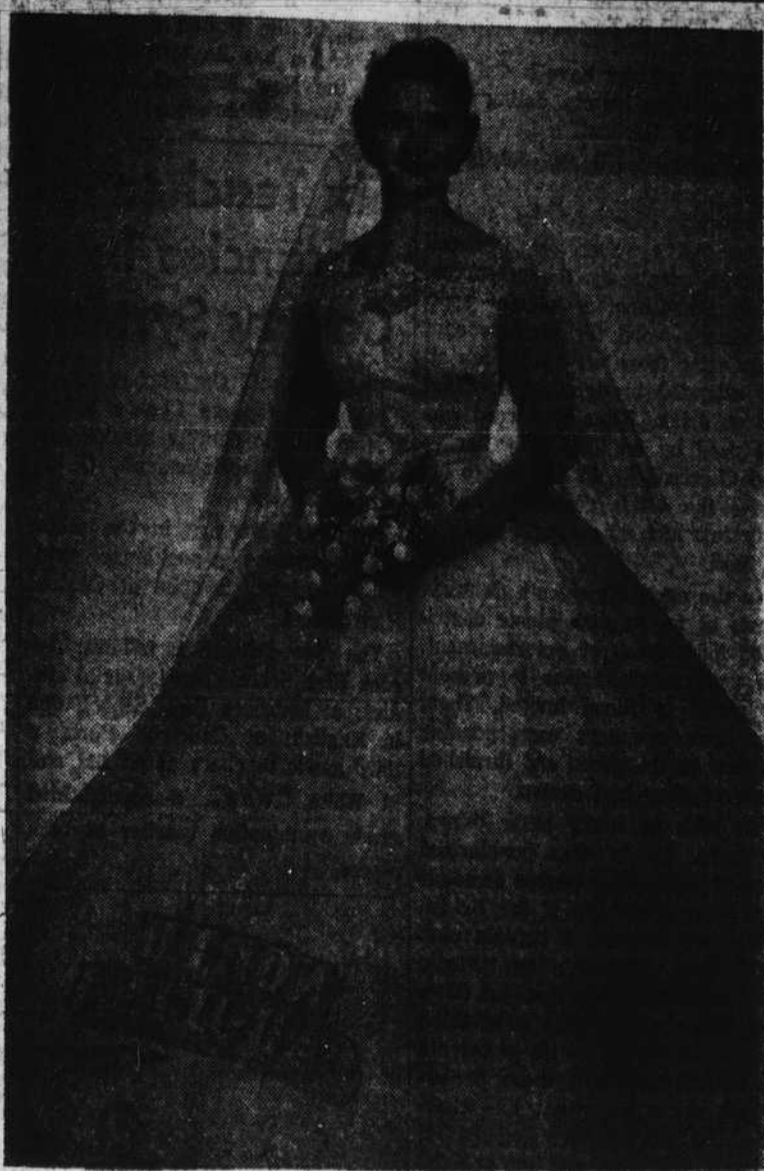

All low-acid foods, including meats and most vegetables take higher-than-boiling temperatures to make sure of killing bacteria that cause dangerous spoilage. Tomatoes are canned safely in a boiling water bath since they are high in acid. "Botulism" is a rare and severe

food infection which may occur in canned foods and has been fatal in a high per cent of the cases on record.

Miss Lola Pritchard, food conservation and marketing specialist for the N. C. Agricultural Extension Service, says that very few cases of botulism have been reported in recent years; but precautionary measures should always be taken to avoid the infection.

Botulism germs are spores, smaller than bacteria. They only thrive in the absence of air which makes canned food a favorable habitat. They favor a food with low acid content as most vegetables. When the spores enter the human body, they multiply and form a poison which attacks the nerves.

Pressure canning is the only safe method of canning all meats and vegetables, except tomatoes. If the germ is present, steam temperature of 240 degrees F. or 10 pounds pressure in your canner will kill it. When you open low-acid canned food, heat them well before serving.
