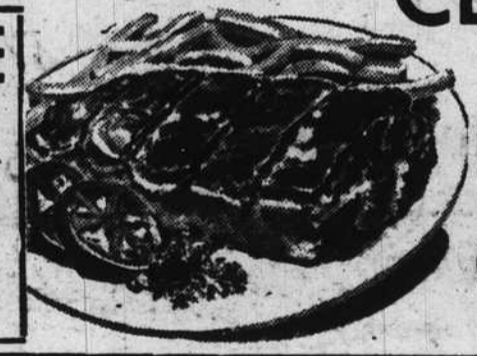

Other business of aldermen in Chapel Hill

Among other matters of business, the Board:
Set the second Monday and the fourth Tuesday monthly for its meetings.
Appointed Mrs. Jake Wicker to the 10-member Recreation Commission, succeeding Mrs. Frederic Cleveland who has left town for the year.
Received requests for a stop-light at Graham and W. Franklin Sts., Durham Rd. and Estes Drive, and a flasher at Hospital Saving parking lot on W. Rosemary St. All were referred to the Streets Committee.
Approved the re-issuance of bond anticipation notes in the amount of \$70,000 for street improvements to the Bank of Chapel Hill at two and one-half per cent and a total of \$40,000 for a fire station and street improvements to Wachovia Bank and Trust Co. for 3.4 per cent.
Agreed to sell an \$18,000 note for the town's new fire truck on Oct. 20. Passed an ordinance prohibiting parking on the east side of N. Columbia St. at Carr St.
Issued a beer license to Douglas Harding for a new establishment on W. Franklin St.
Deferred issuance of a beer license requested by John Marshall Greene for The Chuck Wagon.
Endorsed a request from Mrs. Warner Wells and Park Place residents for a 15 MPH speed zone in this neighborhood.
Referred to the Street Committee a request for a loading zone at 104 W. Franklin St., sought by Ted Danziger.
Switched parking on Pittsboro St. between University Drive and McCauley Streets from the west to the east side.

Income tops costs by about \$10,000 in town last year

The Town of Chapel Hill will probably have about \$10,000 more income than outgo for fiscal 1959-60 when a final accounting is made.
This is the report of Town Manager Thomas D. Rose, who this week said that both the anticipated revenue and expense budgets had been exceeded for the past year.
Spent \$483,352
Budget spending had been set at \$451,576, however a total of \$483,352 was actually spent. This resulted, in the main, from a carry-over of funds from the previous year for street maintenance and repairs and from about \$15,000 in additional payments on bonds, made possible by receipts from curb and gutter assessments.
However, revenue totalling \$486,333 was actually received for the year. When all accounting for the year is completed, the Town Manager said, he anticipated that about \$10,000 in revenue will remain above expenses.
The Town Manager also presented figures showing an improvement in tax collections since the hiring of delinquent tax collector David Roberts last summer. The Board agreed, however, to cooperate with the County in taking legal action against some delinquents on real estate taxes.
96 Pct. collected
The total tax breakdown showed that of the \$2,617,485 tax levy billed by the town in years prior to 1959 all but \$73,682 had been collected—representing 97.18 collection, as of June 30. The percentage had risen to 98.12 by Sept. 30.
The percentage collection for all years including 1959, as of June 30, was 98.23 per cent. However, as of Sept. 30—the day before 1959 taxes were billed—only about one-fifth of the current year's \$267,126 tax levy had been paid. For the previous year, 1958, only 38.57 of the \$266,000 levy was outstanding, representing a collection percentage of 95.71.

Park lots price seen 'very good' for town

The Town of Chapel Hill expects to receive "a very good buying price" for two residential areas it's interested in buying for park properties.
The wooded lots are owned by Coker College and are located at the southwest corner of Raleigh Road and bypass highway and on Laurel Hill Rd. near the bypass.
A municipal official said that the College trustees were ready to set an asking price for this land and were going to "make a very good price for us." He said he could not yet name the exact figure.
