

# fund swap to enable eight-room addition at Glenwood School

Two transfers of funds will enable the Chapel Hill School Board to proceed with construction of an eight-classroom addition to the Glenwood Elementary School.

Estimated to cost \$144,000, the project will run about 50 per cent above the \$100,000 authorized for this work by the County Commissioners in the current year's budget. Arrangements to proceed with it were agreed upon in a joint meeting of Board members with the County Commissioners.

## Enlarged 6-room idea

A six-classroom addition had been proposed for addition to the 12-classroom plant at Glenwood. However, Board members suggested it would be more practical to take advantage of the site elevation at Glenwood by erecting an eight-room unit of about 14,000 feet, with a multi-purpose room.

Emphasizing the need for additional facilities, Superintendent of Schools Joseph Johnston said there had been a 139 per cent increase in pupils of the first

six grades of Chapel Hill schools during the last decade, not including the recently annexed Carrboro area.

At the request of the Chapel Hill Board the Commissioners authorized the transfer to the Glenwood project of \$25,000 earlier set up to buy a site for a future school in Chapel Hill. Superintendent Johnston said arrangements for the rest of the needed money could be worked within the current budget of the local school system.

## Set \$50,000 in bonds

The commissioners also authorized machinery to permit them to issue \$50,000 in bonds, out of the approximately \$66,000 they could legally issue this year without a public vote. A hearing on this matter is set for Nov. 16.

The net school debt after issuance of this sum would be \$2,897,000, representing 3.299 per cent of the current assessed valuation of \$89,724,935 in the County. Law restricts the school debt to five per cent of the valuation.

# Unofficial planning body is appointed

The Hillsboro Board of Commissioners Tuesday night appointed a six-member unofficial planning commission, in accordance with a recommendation submitted to it by two groups five months ago.

The membership, at the invitation of the town board, was nominated on a basis of representation by various civic or-

ganizations.

Purpose of the body, as outlined at the time the proposal was submitted, is to study long-range planning for the overall community, advise the official board on such policies and programs and assist the board, when needed, in interpreting them to the citizens at large.

Named to the commission were Ira A. Ward for the Merchants Association, J. L. Brown Jr. for the Exchange Club, E. J. Hamlin for the Lions Club, Miss Mary B. Forrest for the Business and Professional Women's Club, Mrs. S. G. Barbour for the Hillsboro Garden Club and Leon Bullard for the American Legion.

No plans have been made yet for a convening of this group.

# Three here admit auto parts thefts

An auto parts theft ring with a record of stealing from cars in Chapel Hill and Durham over the past 18 months has been broken up by police.

In addition another person has been arrested for stealing five automobiles locally during last month. All of the cars were recovered, though one was a total loss.

Three youths are involved in the local larcenies, according to Chapel Hill Police Det. Howard Pendergraph. The same persons have been charged in Durham, as well.

## Admit all thefts

The police said that all admitted to the thefts, which netted hundreds of dollars in uncounted separate robberies. Detective Pendergraph said those arrested had

been under suspicion for a number of months before enough evidence was gathered for the joint arrests in Durham and Chapel Hill.

These charged are Roy Harold Vickers, 20-year-old painter of Carrboro; Elmer Clifton Stewart, 22, factory worker, of Route One, Pittsboro; and Jerome Seagroves, 20, of Pittsboro.

Seagroves admitted stealing five automobiles here during October, according to the police. The arresting officers said he apparently just took a car whenever he wanted it and then later abandoned it.

The other two admitted stripping parked cars in Chapel Hill and Durham after midnight. Durham police said Stewart confessed to having made over a thousand dollars on the sale of stolen parts.

# Cedar Grove school addition contracts given for \$14,342

The Orange County Board of Education Monday awarded a contract for a two-classroom addition to the Cedar Grove Elementary School.

Low bidder at \$13,467 was the Delta Construction Co. of Durham. That with an additional \$875.35 in architect's fees will bring the cost of the addition to \$14,342.35.

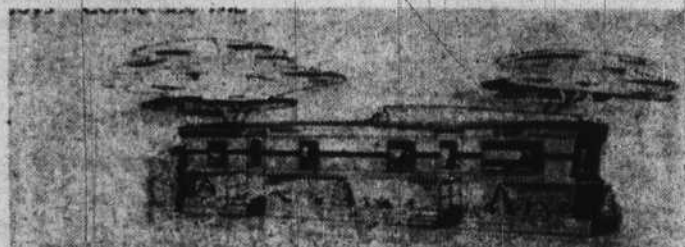
