A cast of four professional actors will be featured in the DocuDrama production of "Which Way The Wind," to be presented Sunday evening at 8:15 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall of Chapel Hills Presbyterian Student Center.

Albert Bigelow, author of "The Voyage Of The Golden Rule" and the skipper of the sketch, "Golden Rule," is producer and a member of the cast. The "Golden Rule" sailed into the restricted Pacific test area in 1956 to protest nuclear testing.

The performance here will be one of more than 50 being presented on a nationwide tour by the American Friends Service Committee, a Quaker-related agency working for peace and human welfare.

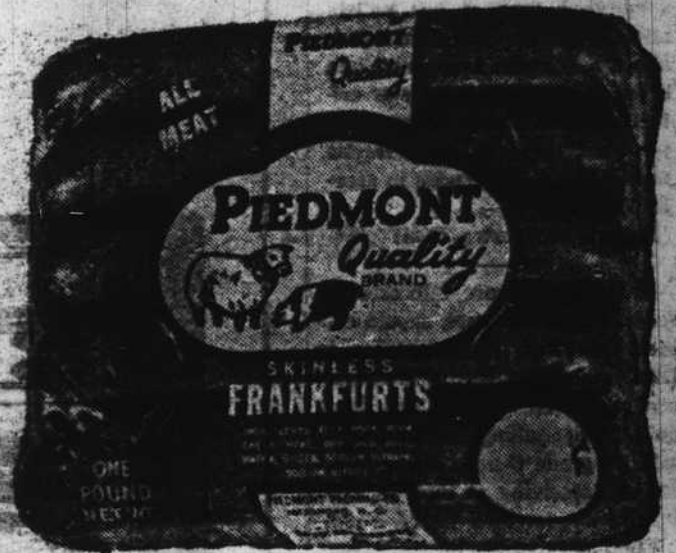
