### Rack 'Rockets' in rain, 19-0 . . .

## League champion Hillsboro Wildcat gridders will face Washington there on November 20

Two events that have more or less become common place Friday-night occurrences came about again last weekend, — it rained, and Hillsboro High School won another football game.

But the 2000-plus spectators at Orange Speedway may claim that the eight o'clock gully washer was no ordinary rain, and the 19-0 victory the Wildcats took from the Roxboro Rockets was certainly no ordinary football game. By winning their fifth consecutive game and their seventh in eight league starts, the locals held harness on their first District Three championship.

#### Best in recent weeks

The great all-round show put on by the rampaging 'Cats was one of their best showings in recent weeks. Everything was riding on the outcome of this game-of-games, and Auman's charges proved themselves of championship calibre by sweeping up all the marbles from the team that had taken the crown in '58 and was in a second place tie going into the contest.

Final standings in the tough North Central AAA loop saw Hillsboro trailed by Henderson, Roxboro, Chapel Hill, Oxford, Northern, Graham, Southern, and Oxford Orphanage in that order.

Richard Blackwelder, Walter Swainey, and Marvin Teer scored the touchdowns, but it was up to a little-used fullback to provide the offensive spark for the win. Daryl Wagner, a 135-pound junior back who had only seen spot duty as a ball carrier, came on in replacement of injured plunger Joe Barnes and ground out 42 yards on the ground.

#### Great work in line

The Hillsboro line turned in a tremendous performance, with such standouts as Jim Ray, Marvin Teer, Jack Dowdy, Billy Mishoe, Butch Raynor, Odas White, Jack Knight, and Wayne Davis making vital contributions for the winning cause.

Hillsboro was stopped early in the game on its own 49, and Swainey punted out to the Roxboro 14. The rugged Wildcat defense held the Rockets to eight yards in three plays, forcing a kicking situation.

The center made a poor pass and the punter fumbled the ball, giving tackle Bill Mishoe time to deflect the kick-try. Hillsboro recovered and took over at the eight.

A Roxboro penalty carried the ball to the four, and Wagner's three-yard gain put it on the one. Marvin Dickey fumbled a pitchout, and Swainey recovered at the eleven for a 10-yard loss. Rising

to the demands of the situation quarterback Richard Blackwelder carried on a direct snap keeper play, going around the left side behind some fine blocking for the score. Jim Ray sped around right end for the point-after.

#### Roxboro drives

Roxboro began a drive following this score, carrying from their 25 to the Hillsboro 44 in eight plays. On fourth down the terrific Wildcat line broke through to stop Donnie Lamb's punt attempt and throw him for a 13-yard loss. Hillsboro drove down to the 34, from where Swainey punted to the Rocket 12. On third down, Lamb fumbled and Hillsboro's Jack Dowdy recovered at the 18. Two losses on attempted end sweeps foiled the prospective TD try.

To begin the second half, the Rockets carried from their own 24 to the Hillsboro 43, where Butch Raynor recovered Lamb's fumble.

Hillsboro was forced to punt again, but regained possession when Jim Ray recovered another fumble. Ray had just hauled down Sam Green from behind on the Hillsboro 21 after the Roxboro speedster had threatened to score with a 54 yard dash.

Four plays later Ray himself went 53 yards to paydirt, only to have his score voided on a pen-
