They dispersed about 11 p.m. Police Chief Bill Blake called in all local policemen on duty to be prepared for any possible disorder. The idea of the noisy demonstration was apparently a raid on the nearby women's dormitories. However, the demonstrators' spirit seemed to fizzle out before the co-ed curfew hour.
