Chapel Hill-Carrboro merchants' annual madcap bargain sale—Hot Diggity Day—will be staged tomorrow under sponsorship of the Merchants Association.

Special purchase items, as well as a raft of reduced price sale goods from stock are advertised in this issue of The News.

Co-chairman of the event sponsored through the Association's Trade Promotions Committee are Milton Julian and Ty Boyd.

As a special feature of the sale this year free hot dogs and soft drinks will be served to all comers Friday afternoon from three downtown sidewalk stands.

They'll be prepared in a pastrami wrap under direction of Ted Danziger at the Zoom-Zoom. Merchants will man the stands in front of the Zoom-Zoom, J. B. Robbins, and Ledbetter-Pickard stores.

Three-thousand all-meat hot dogs have been donated for the promotion by the Piedmont Packing Co. of Hillsboro, 3,000 rolls by Holsum bread, and soft drinks from the Durham Pepsi Cola Bottling Co.

CAP plans rescue unit; organizing cadet corps

Organization of an emergency rescue squad and a cadet program is being planned by the newly-organized Chapel Hill Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol.

Future plans for the group were announced at its charter night banquet last Friday. Group Seven Commander Maj. R. B. Hester of Henderson presented the national charter to local Commander Joe Augustine.

The local commander said the rescue squad would be organized right away, as soon as a truck soon to be obtained, can be fixed up. The cadet program is to be

set up by September for boys and girls between the ages of 14 and 21. In addition, Augustine announced, the squadron hopes to foster a greater interest in aviation locally and to work toward improving the facilities at the Chapel Hill Airport.

Gift made public to board . . .

Anonymous donor offers money for Negro pool

An anonymous donor has offered the money necessary to build a swimming pool in Chapel Hill's Negro community.

The offer was made public Monday night to the Town Board in a report by Alderman Mrs. Harold Walters, Chairman of the Board's Recreation Committee.

She said the un-disclosed sum would be given the recently-organized Chapel Hill-Carrboro Swimming Pool Association, Inc.

Build by Negro Center

This body has asked permission to have the pool built on the town's Negro Community Center property off Mitchell Lane. After it's built it would be turned over to the Town for operation through the municipal Recreation Commission, according to the proposal of Swimming Pool Association President Adolphus Clerk.

The aldermen passed a two-part motion expressing the Town's gratitude for the potential gift, and naming Mayor O. K. Cornwell and a committee of his choosing to immediately explore the legalities of the proposal. The Mayor named to this group Mrs. Walters as chairman, Mr. Clark, Town Attorney J. Q. LeGrand, and Town Manager Thomas D. Rose.

As currently envisioned the pool would be an outdoor facility, including a bath house and parking

lot. It would be supported through the Negro Center's budget from the Community Chest, as well as by admission charges.

No public funds

Though the Recreation Commission has been officially set up to administer the Town's recreation program for the last 20 years, no public funds are appropriated for this purpose. However, the Town does maintain at its own expense the Negro Community Center building which was given it shortly after World War II, during which the Navy used it as a barracks.

Authorization by public vote of the local citizens would be necessary to appropriate any tax funds for recreational purposes. But the Town could earmark non-tax money for this purpose.

The legal stumbling blocks to be cleared up by the study committee, in the judgment of Mayor Cornwell, are the Town's liability in running the swimming pool, and any questions that might arise on its authority to maintain it.

The Association did not want to run the pool itself under a long-term lease of the site from the Town, according to Association President Clark. The Board's Recreation Committee also recom-

mented that the facility be operated by the Town through its Recreation Commission.

5 pct. increase seen to about 3,630 pupils expected in Chapel Hill

An enrollment increase of about five per cent has been forecast for the Chapel Hill public schools this fall.

Superintendent Joseph M. Johnston said an attendance of 3,630 is forecast when the fall term begins on Sept. 6. This would be 181 above the 3,449 who enrolled last fall.

The Superintendent said it was possible that the 10-classroom addition being rushed to completion at the Glenwood Elementary School would be ready for the opening of the new year. At the Franklin St. School grading and paving in the playground area is being completed at the present time.
