The idea was aired before the Board of Aldermen by Town Manager Thomas D. Rose. He suggested this as "a much fai.er" me.hod than the current plan whereby a flat \$12 annual charge is made for each water closet in a dwelling.

The Board's Finance Committee had been asked to study a policy for sewer charges with the idea of bringing the fees more Rd. at the Chapel Hill-Carrboro closely in line with the actual cost of rendering the service to Manager directed to get further individual residents.


UNC would aid
