

Sewer rate based on water use proposed to Chapel Hill board

Sewer rates based on water consumption have been proposed to the Town of Chapel Hill.

The idea was aired before the Board of Aldermen by Town Manager Thomas D. Rose. He suggested this as "a much fairer" method than the current plan whereby a flat \$12 annual charge is made for each water closet in a dwelling.

The Board's Finance Committee had been asked to study a policy for sewer charges with the idea of bringing the fees more closely in line with the actual cost of rendering the service to individual residents.

UNC would aid

Town Manager Rose said the University Utilities Department had pledged its cooperation to the proposed plan to the extent of allowing a Town clerk to check customer water consumption records annually for the sewer billing purposes.

No action was taken on the plan at the Board's Monday night meeting.

On an allied matter, Finance Committee Chairman Paul Wager said his group felt that the Board should not at this time alter its policy of not promising re-imbursement to private constructors of sewer lines when the town takes over such lines. However, Wager pointed out, the Town might consider paying for installation of major

sewer outfall lines.

The Town Manager also reported receipt of a letter from state Director of Highways W. F. Babcock, stating that a meeting would soon be held with the town on the town's request for additional cross-over spots on the proposed Raleigh Road four-laning project.

Want traffic light

Installation of a traffic light at the five-way intersection of W. W. Franklin St. and Merritt Mill Rd. at the Chapel Hill-Carrboro line was discussed and the Town Manager directed to get further information on the matter.

It was announced that sidewalk paving of two blocks on Esies Drive would begin soon, following receipt of petitions for this from abutting property owners who will bear 60 per cent of this cost.

A list of community needs as prepared by the Jaycees on the basis of a recent survey of residents was read and passed on to the Town Manager for his recommendations.

Reginald Rawls and Herman Lloyd of Oakwood Drive appeared to ask an early start of curbing

of their street. The Board agreed to proceed at once with this and other projects on which surveys were complete.

Renew \$80,000 note

An \$80,000 bond anticipation note for storm and sanitary sewer construction work was renewed for six months from Nov. 1 to Branch Bank and Trust Co. of Wilson for two and one-quarter per cent.

On recommendation of the Town Manager, the Board informally agreed to include a sewer line that could serve Ross Scroggs' home in pending sewer line installations.

County to buy five new cars from Yates'

Five new cars will be bought by the County under a contract for \$9,097 awarded to Yates Motor Co. of Chapel Hill.

The County Commissioners last Friday approved Yates' bid as the lowest of four on four patrol cars for the sheriff's department and a new vehicle for the tax collector. The sheriffs will get 1961 Plymouths and the tax collector, a Valiant.

The commissioners also received the resolution from the Chapel Hill School Board for a school bond election next year. No action is scheduled until their next regular meeting.

County Accountant Sam Gattis was authorized to spend up to \$400 to help a state veterinarian who is in the county to check beef cattle for Bangs disease.

Sitting as the Board of Equalization and Review, the commissioners declined to change the tax value on the home of Bobby Hightower of Cheek's township.


The 20 persons appointed were Arthur Tuttle, Lennie Rosenbluth, the Rev. Loren Mead, Garland
