Location of a store in the business area of Chapel Hill has long been favored by many of the downtown business interests, by residents of the wide area west and south of Chapel Hill who find the Eastgate store inconvenient and inaccessible, and by law enforcement officers who favor location of a store nearer the low-income Negro residential section as a bootlegging deterrent.

### Voters approve school bond issue by margin of almost two-to-one

Voters of Orange County las: Saturday approved the \$1.5 million school construction bond issue by a margin of almost twoto-one.

There were 2,836 ballots for the issue and 1,513 against. The poll total of 4,349 represented approximately 28 per cent of the 15,498 registered voters.

All 13 rural precincts voted against the proposal. However eight of the nine urban boxesincluding all of Chapel Hill and Hillsborg, supported it. Carrboro went against the bonds - 253 to 198.

More than half the votes were cast in Chapel Hill's five precincts where the margin of support was better than eight-to-one. There 2,057 votes were marked "yes" and 263, "no."-and 88 per cent favorable rates.

The decision of the voters gives the county commissioners authority to issue bonds providing \$840.-000 for construction in the Chapel Hill School System and \$660,000 in the County System, as previously agreed between the two school boards.

It's expected to bring a 10-cent increase in the current tax rate of \$.99 per \$100 valuation. The \$1.5 million issue is the first step in a projected \$5.1 million improvements program for the next decade. The plan calls for appropriating the remainder out of annual budgets at \$200,000 a year.
