HAS ANYBODY EVER HEARD of a neighborhood in the Knolls Development of Chapel Hill being called "Piesville?" It was referred to at the realtors' meeting on urban renewal recently. But never heard of "Piesville."

THE VALUE OF REAL ESTATE bordering on W. Rosemary St. in Chapel Hill will be enhanced by the proposed widening of the street—in the opinion of the Chapel Hill Board of Realtors—in excess of the value of frontage that will have to be taken for this purpose. The realtors were asked by the Town Board to assess the property concerned. The Town is planning momentarily to contact the individual land owners and begin negotiations with them.

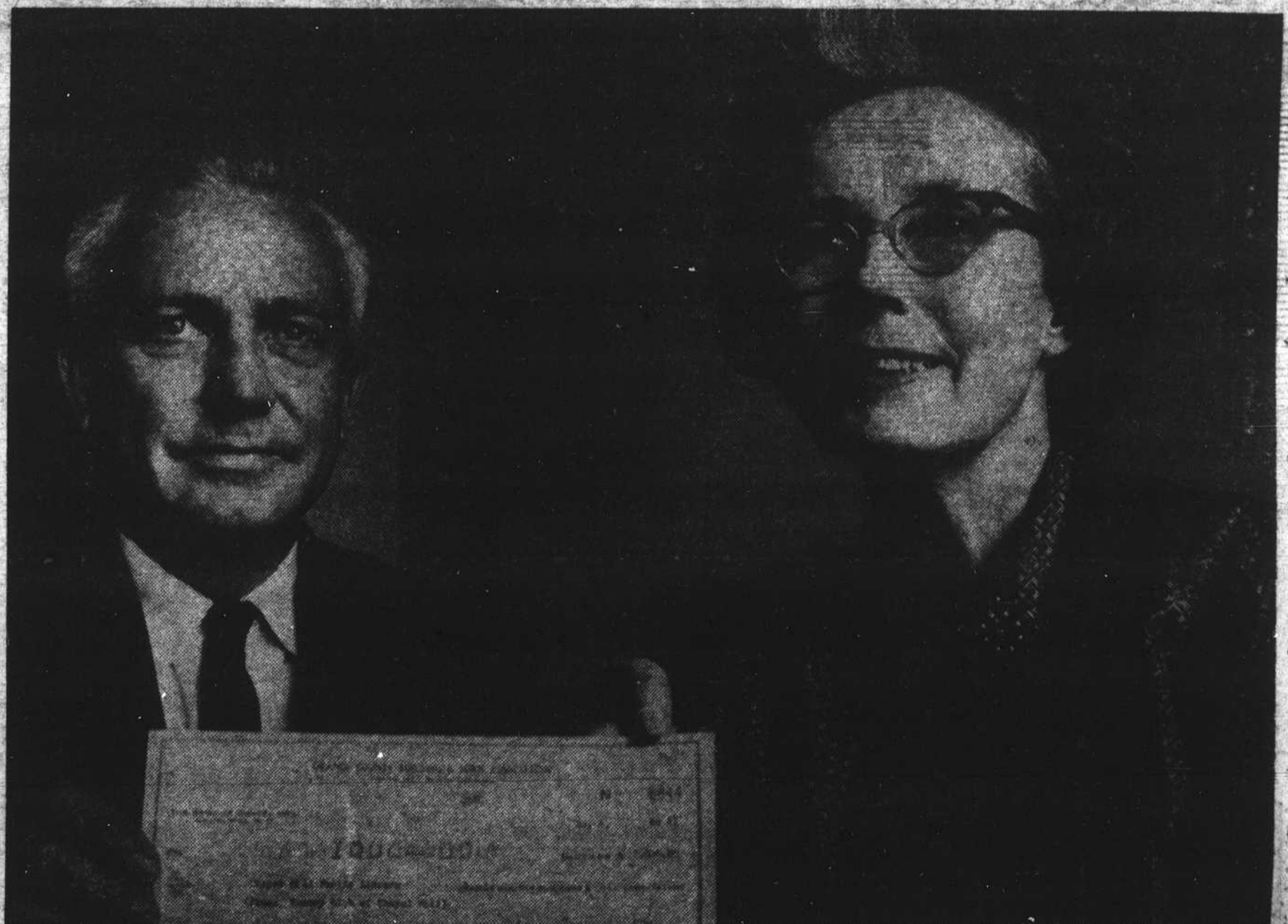
