HERB HOLLAND AND TED Tillman, Chapel Hill's leading Civil War buffs, will attend their third annual seminar in Civil War lore at Gettysburg College next week. Mr. and Mrs. Tillman were witnesses last week to the re-enactment of the Battle of Second Manassas.—The Battle of Gettysburg won't get a similar re-hashing, Mr. Holland reports, since the cost of such a performance has been calculated at \$3 million—or roughly \$6 for each of the 500,000 men that actually fought in it.
