Wayne H. Cooksey, 46, is victim of suicide

Wayne H. Cooksey, 46-year-old assistant manager for foods at the Carolina Inn, was found shot to death on a Durham street Sunday night. Durham County Coroner, Dr. D. R. Perry ruled the shooting suicide.

Cooksey died instantly from a single shot fired in the heart with a .32 caliber revolver.

The body was discovered shortly after 8 p. m. by a passerby who reportedly thought the man had been hit by a car.

Cooksey's pockets were said to be completely empty, except for one piece of paper bearing a suicide note.

According to Sheriff Mangum, the note gave no indication of Cooksey's reason for taking his life, but gave the identity of his two sisters living in Durham and told where they could be reached. The note also gave the directions as to what should be done with his body.

Cooksey, a native of Monticello, lived with one of his sisters, Mrs. Kate Cooksey Hall.

He had been raised in Florida, but had lived in Durham for a number of years.
