

New school for Orange...



Here's the architect's perspective of the new Orange High School for which plans are now being drawn for contract letting early next Spring. In the center of the layout leading from the entrance lobby is a 1,000 seat auditorium, flanked by a student union and auxiliary rooms. Immediately to the left are the two 2-story classroom wings. The small building to the far left between the classroom wings is the library. To the rear of the auditorium is the lunchroom and kitchen on the left and the band room on the right and adjacent thereto is the boiler room, easily identified by the smokestack shown here. The area to the right of the entrance foyer and auditorium is the gymnasium

and the building at far right is the industrial arts and vocational agriculture shop. The dotted line area near the conter of the photo represents additional future classroom and lunchroom construction when they are needed. A football stadium in a natural contour is shown at top of the layout. A planned parking area is located just outside the pictured area to the left and a baseball diamond to the right. The physical plant contains over 114,000 square feet with the two classroom wings, the library, auditorium, lunchroom, and shop areas receiving priority for the first phase of construction.
