Off-campus housing survey to be made

With the cooperation of the Chapel Hill Board of Realtors and a faculty committee on housing, the University is initiating a study of local off-campus housing in Chapel Hill and Orange County with a view to assuring desirable standards for dwelling among students who do not live in dormitories.

A survey is now being conducted to gain a realistic picture of housing for students outside the University's residence halls, and it is expected that a set of standards will be available for the guidance of students and for those who may wish to rent rooms, apartments and other dwellings to students.

The University is now in the process of formulating standards which may be necessary to protect the health and safety of students.

Standards established will be derived partly from studies conducted by the American College Health Association. However, these standards may be altered when necessary to comply with conditions that may be peculiar to the University community.



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
