THE ALL-DAY HIKE OVER the three-peak Pinnacles near Meadows-of-Dan, Va., was completed by all of the 107 who started out on the 12-mile trek; and none of 'em fell out. In all there were a record 142 scouts and adults who went on the trip -122 scouts and 20 leaders.

FIRE ALARMS IN CHAPEL Hill have been fortunately sparse during the month of March. -Then three calls came in within an hour during church time last Sunday. A general alarm was sounded on one in the fire district - a brush blaze in the woods north of Branch St., which burned over about an acre. Minutes after their return the firemen were called to 325 Lindsay St. to put out a minor blaze caused by an overheated oil circulator. And while there they received a call to the postoffice where a trash can was on fire.

IT MAY HAVE BEEN ONLY coincidence, Chapel Hill Town Manager Bob Peck reports, but traffic accidents in town were more than halved from the previous month's total in February, when the police department's new radar speed clock was used extensively. There were 18 arrests and numerous warnings to speeders. The February accident total was 11, as compared to 24 in January.

THE SOGGY CONDITION OF the rain-soaked grass runway at Horace Williams Airport caused an expensive accident there late last Thursday to a T-28 singleengine trainer plane from Andrews Air Force Base near Washington. In landing the plane wheels mired in so deep that the damaged. A replacement engine had to be shipped from Washington. The Chapel Hill Civil Air Patrol took note of the mishap in its continuing campaign to have the University improve the inadequate and unsafe facilities of their airport.
