## 10,000 acres of crops are to be measured

Approximately 10,000 acres of tobacco, cotton, corn and grain sorghum will be measured within the next seven weeks in Orange County, says W. M. Snipes, Chairman of the Orange County ASCS County Committee.

A major part of the ASCS Production Adjustment Programs is the measuring of these acres after planting and prior to harvest. These measurements are accomplished in the flue cured tobacco, and cotton areas by visiting the farm and determining where allotment crops are planted and plotting the acreage through the use of aerial photographs.


