

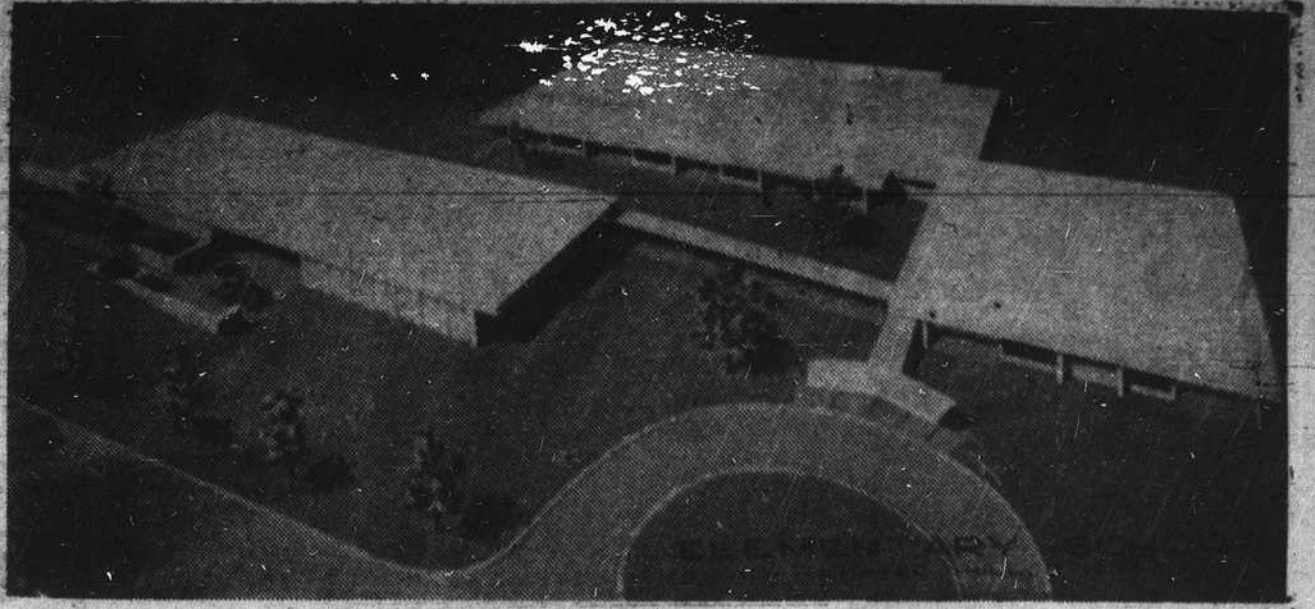

NEW LOOK IN SCHOOL BUILDINGS — The new 12-classroom Frank Porter Graham School in Chapel Hill, scheduled for completion this summer, will be of distinctly different design from other school buildings in Orange County. At the left is the cafeteria and administrative wing, while in the center is the 12-classroom instructional wing. An additional 12-classroom wing is envisioned for the future as shown at the right. The building was designed by City Planning and Architectural Associates of Chapel Hill and is located on the southwest bypass highway near Smith Level Road.

A FREE-FOR-ALL BETWEEN white and Negro boys on the athletic field at Hillsboro high school last Thursday afternoon, a matter of concern to leaders of both races in the community, may wind up in Records Court next Monday. Names of all participants could not be obtained, so none are being published at this time. One boy received a gash on the head requiring five stitches to close. No others apparently were hurt. From best information available, taunts were hurled from the playground to a group of Negro youths passing along the street. Rocks were exchanged. The Negroes came onto the playground, a battle ensued until a large contingent of Hillsboro High boys emerged from the school, at which time the smaller group fled and the whole affair was brought under control.

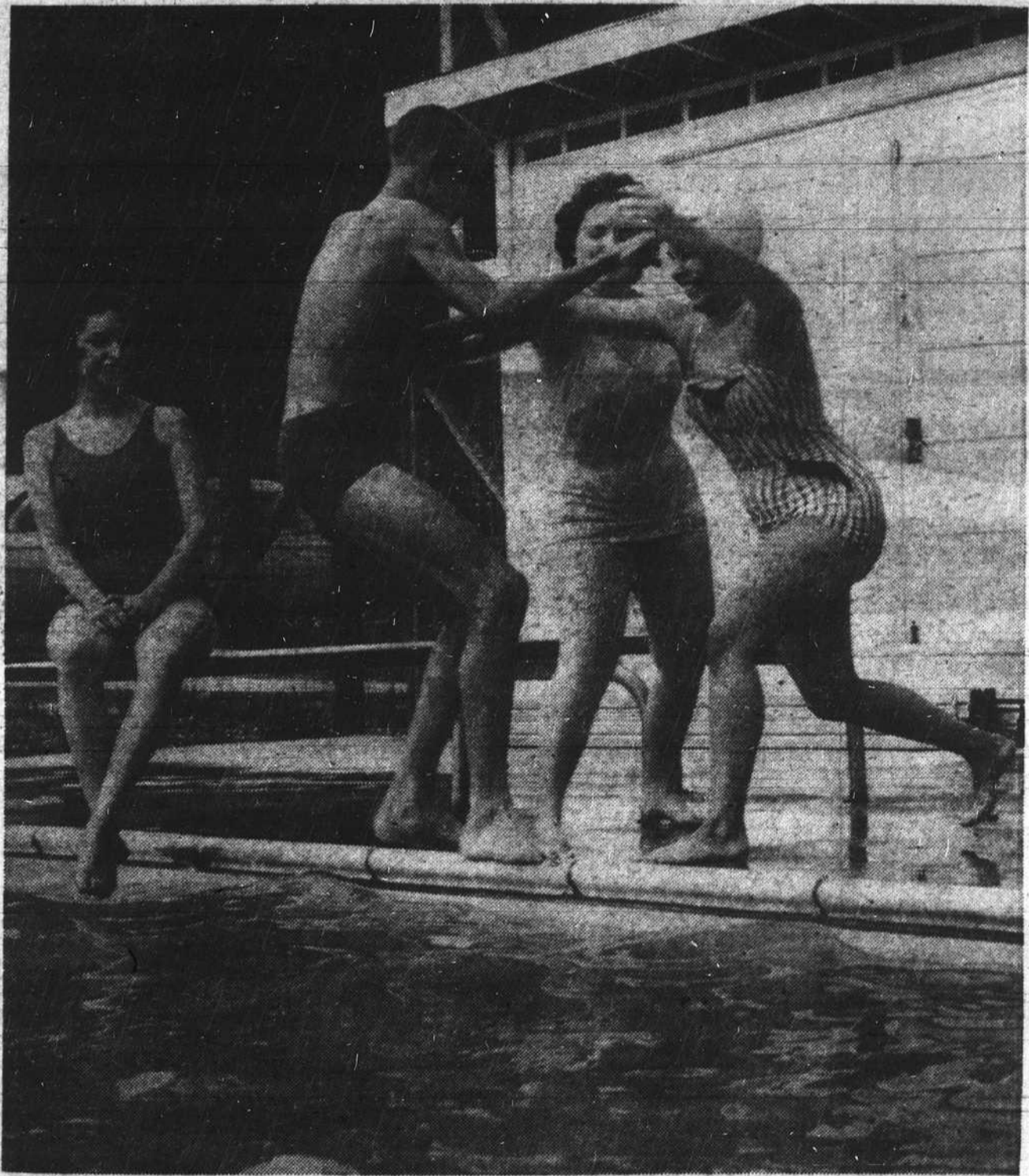
