Tomato operation and supper in Aycock community top area development tour

Area Development Tour June 20

Plans have been completed for the North Central Area Development Tour of the three counties to be held Wednesday afternoon, June 20. The assembly point will be Northern High School on Highway 501, eight miles north of Durham. Those attending from Orange County might want to go down the St. Mary's-Mason Road to 501 and turn right on 501 for two miles. The tour starts at 2:00 p. m.

At 2:15 we will arrive at the diversified farm of Paul and Blayne Burmahl. These two young men have made a success of feeder pig production and layers.

At 3:45 we will arrive at Ira Wolf's farm in Bushy Fork Community in Person County. Ira has recently completed construction of a tobacco bulk curing unit with the capacity of 950 sticks of tobacco which is the equivalent of the standard curing barn.

At 5:00 we will go to the farms of Munn Allen and Wilfred Phelps of the Aycock Community in Orange County. Here we will see the vine-ripened tomatoes in the seven plastic greenhouses. They also have ten acres of tomatoes growing in the field.

At 6:00 the ladies of Aycock Community in Orange County have prepared one of their famous suppers, which will be sold for \$1.50 per plate. Please notify your County Agent if you expect to attend.

Dairy News

William Neville, of the Homestead Community, has beaten the drought with 12 acres of Sudan grass to be used for temporary grazing. This is knee high, and Mr. Neville plans to start grazing immediately.

The Chapel Hill Kiwanis Club has invited the 1962 County Dairy Princess to their June 12 dinner meeting where she will be crowned in an appropriate ceremony.

Gale Faris, young State College graduate, will begin DHIA testing June 15. All Orange and Durham dairymen who have been waiting for this testing

New Brooder House

Henry Johnson, Jr., of the Schley Community, is building a brooder house 40 feet wide and 264 feet long. This building, along with an adjacent structure, will be used to grow out the pullets for his flock of 35,000 layers.

Feeder Pigs Good Bet

Several local feeder pig producers report that they have sold the most feeder pigs this year and received the highest

prices for the pigs of any year they have been in the business. Quite a few producers have increased the size of their brood sow herd. Several new producers have started herds of from six to 25 sows. There is still room for more expansion of feeder pig production in Orange County. This enterprise should be given serious consideration by many other persons whose farm income is limited. VA completes survey; 479,000 veterans now living in N.C.

The latest survey made by the Veterans Administration shows there are 479,000 war veterans now living in North Carolina, according to J. D. DeRamus, manager of the Veterans Regional Office.

Of this total number, 316,000 are veterans of World War II. There are 118,000 veterans of the Korean Conflict while an additional 21,000 veterans, already listed with the World War II veterans, saw service also in the Korean Conflict.

North Carolina also has 42,000 veterans of World War I, according to the latest VA tally while an additional 3,000 veterans of the Spanish-American War, the Indian Wars and career ex-servicemen who now receive compensation reside within the state.

The total number of veterans as of December 31, 1961, the date of this survey, stood at 2,338,000 with 15,138,000 World War II veterans; 4,542,000 Korean Conflict veterans; 2,511,000 World War I veterans, and 147,000 other veterans including Spanish-American War, Indian Wars and career ex-servicemen comprising Ruglar Establishment.
