AROUND THE WORLD SUBMERGED by CAPT. EDWARD L. BEACH. A personal account by the skipper of the nuclear-powered sub, USS Triton that circled the globe without surfacing. When the Triton was commissioned in 1960, instead of a routine shakedown cruise, Beach was ordered to accomplish his dramatic mission to prove the reliability of nuclear submarines and bolster the faltering Polaris program. He describes the voyage in detail, and tells of the near-calamities that threatened the voyage—the serious illness of a seaman, the loss of some essential equipment, how the officers and crew worked together, and the entertainment they managed to find in a highly restricted way of life.

WORLD SERIES THRILLS by JOSEPH BELL. A detailed examination of ten of the top thrills in World Series play from 1912 to 1960. The incidents recounted here include some of the most spectacular, as well as the most boneheaded plays in baseball history. Illustrated with photographs.
