

Town, county would be big gainers in lieu-of-taxes state proposal

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'MISS JENNIE' JORDAN McDade of Hurdle Mills, Route One, will observe her 100th birthday today. Likely Orange County's oldest citizen, she still enjoys relatively good health and maintains an alert interest in public affairs—especially those of the Democratic party to which she holds total allegiance.

THE ORANGE COUNTY Board of Elections is contemplating a complete re-registration prior to next year's party primary elections of all voters in the 10 precincts of Orange County outside of the Chapel Hill and Hillsboro Townships — in which full re-registrations were held several years ago. The books of the 15 precincts in these two townships contain an estimated 10,000 of the approximately 16,000 names currently on the voting books. Last county-wide re-registration was about 10 years ago.

ANENT ELECTIONS, THE Chapel Hill school officials this week let it be known they'll try again next spring for a referendum on increasing the district supplementary school tax — now being levied at its presently-authorized maximum rate of \$.20 per \$100 valuation. In a referendum on the question last year the issue was defeated.

PICKETING OF THE COL- lege Cafe in downtown Chapel Hill has gone without any incidents since the UNC Student Peace Union - sponsored drive began last Friday, according to local police. A pair of silent sign-carrying marchers have walked in front of the restaurant from 7 a. m. till the 2:30 p. m. closing time steadily. Officers said they've occasionally found it necessary to call attention to certain provisions of the local ordinance on picketing, but that the demonstrators have been cooperative, and to their knowledge there've been no public hecklers.
