CHAPEL HILL OFFICIALS went to Raleigh yesterday afternoon to appear at a public hearing held by the State Government Committee of the Legislature and speak in behalf of the "lieu-of-taxes" bill — a measure which could mean \$140,000 in revenue a year to Chapel Hill and Orange County. There was little indication from the committee members as to their initial sentiments on the bill except for Orange County Rep. Jim Phipps, who will of course plug hard for its passage.

ORANGE COUNTY'S NEW "honorable" gave an interim report on his General Assembly activity to his fellow Rotarians in Chapel Hill last night. Brief notes on this: He's optimistic on his American Legion-sponsored American government course bill. Has introduced 14 local bills to date. Passed on a June 25 "inside dope" legislature adjournment date prediction. Is plugging a Bennett Place commemorative centennial postage stamp issuance for April 25, 1965. Likes the "comma" name for State College. And also the proposed manufacturers' inventory tax exemption.

MOST OF THE CHAPEL HILL and Carrboro candidates in Tuesday's elections hovered around the ballot counting and compiling centers to await the verdicts. Not so, Chapel Hill Alderman Joe Page. He and 'Miss Wick' went to the University Symphony spring concert in Hill Hall. A friend had to seek 'em out in the auditorium during the third movement of Beethoven's Seventh Symphony to let Chapel Hill's music-loving alderman know he'd been re-elected.

WELL OVER 2,000 PERSONS from throughout the area tramped through Jerry Tempest's unique new Villa Tempesta during his open house function last Saturday. The display studios and downstairs cafe espresso garden will open for regular business today. General reaction of the public was to tag it a brand new "must see" on the sight-seeing circuit of the "Hill."

ORANGE COUNTY IS NOT going to the dogs. They are already here, if Dog Warden Cashe Boggs' report is a criteria. During the past three months he alone has vaccinated 1,746, impounded 375, found new homes for 12, shot 96, gassed 301 and sold \$104 worth to Duke Hospital.

ORANGE COUNTY'S ABC system is still a potent money maker despite opening of stores in two adjoining counties in the past year. ABC Chairman Remus Smith Sr. reported net profits of \$181,213.48 for the nine months ending March 31, only \$5,070 less than the similar period of 1961-62.

CHAPEL HILL HAS THE distinction of being the home town of one of the 13 holders of federal government \$50 occupational waging stamps for the current fiscal year. The purchaser, according to Internal Revenue Service records, is James M. Mangum of 612 Christopher Rd. — victim of a yet unsolved shooting-robbery at his home last fall.
