TWO ORANGE COUNTY OFFICIALS attending state association meetings in Asheville this week have been elected first vice-president of their respective organizations. Five troopers were on hand at the time of the July 19 civil disobedience sit-in. Their job was to seal off the immediately affected area to prevent anybody coming in who might possibly create violence.

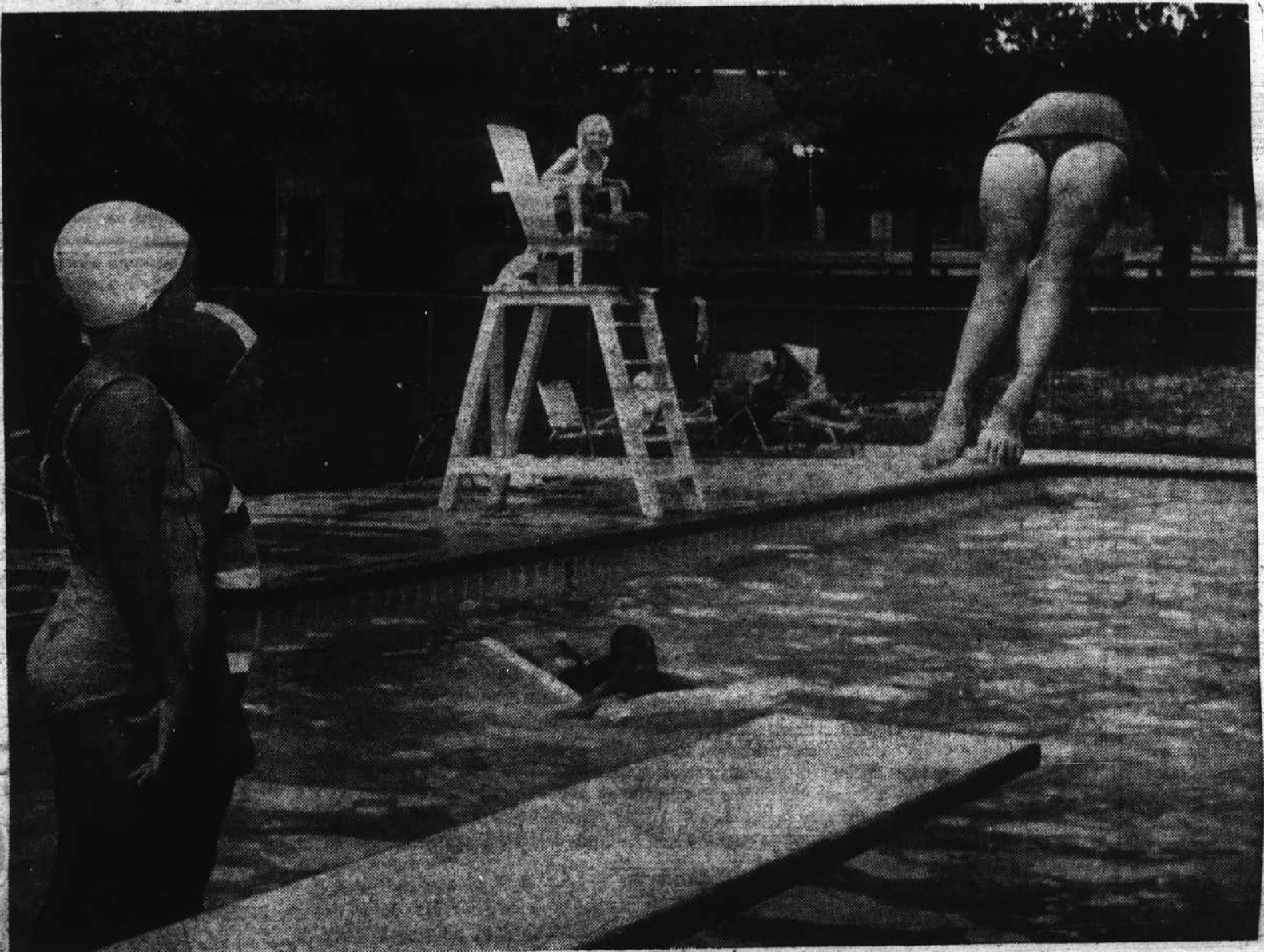
