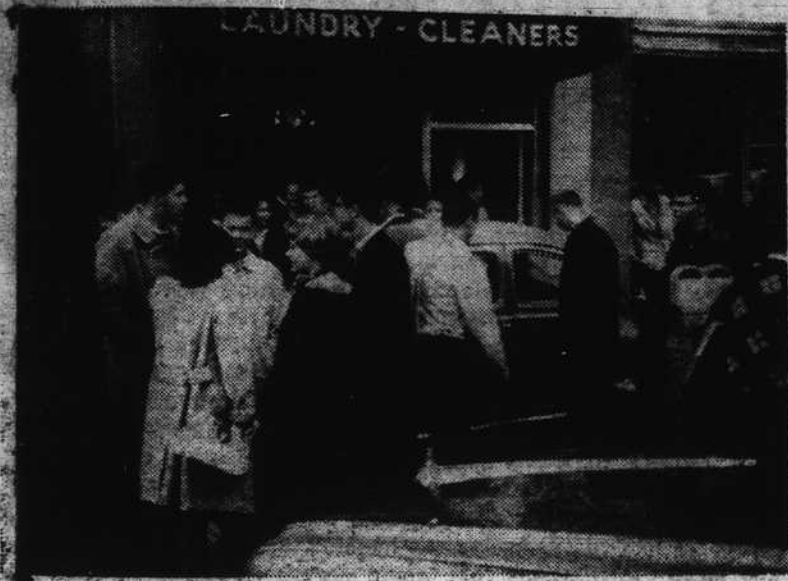


Illegal parking? ...



PEDESTRIAN HAZARD—Charges of driving on the sidewalk or issuance of an illegal parking ticket were jokingly considered in connection with an off-beat downtown Chapel Hill mishap Tuesday afternoon. The driver, UNC student Odell Beck Jr., told Patrolman George Penney the brakes on his car failed as he pulled into a parking place. His car bounced onto the sidewalk, struck pedestrian W. A. Braxton and knocked him down, and dented a fender as it struck a store building. The patrolman said there were no serious injuries, and that an inspection revealed a broken pin in the brake rod of the auto. The driver was not charged.
