N. C. NATIONAL BANK WAS low bidder and purchased \$45,-000 in Chapel Hill Town Hall improvement bonds this week with a bid of 2.9 per cent interest on the nine-year issue. N.C.N.B. was also low bidder on a companion \$180,000 sewer bond issue but lost out on a technicality.
