'Guilford bucked tradition'

As keynote speaker for the meeting, Rep. Kornegay noted that his county "went against its time-tested tradition two years ago." Of the five-member Guilford GOP delegation to the legislature, he recalled, "after one term in Raleigh about half of that car-load wanted to be governor and the other half thoughtthey ought to stay home and sit this one out." It was as well that none have sought re-election, he suggested, because "the people of Guilford County are now aware that the best people to get any job done are Democrats."

The youthful Congressman, un-opposed in his own party for re-nomination to a third term, left the Orange convention immediately after his talk to attend the Guilford Democratic conclave. Earlier he'd been at the Alamance Demo-
