HIS "WARMEST SUPPORT" as a taxpayer was pledged by sweltering Jake Wicker as he appealed to the Chapel Hill aldermen on Tuesday night to install air-conditioning in their courtroom meeting place. —All the while the creaking old-time wooden-blade fans silently twirled their listless circuits above, scarcely unsettling the stifling atmosphere. Wicker's plea won a "warm reception" from the aldermen, but no action, this being the annual budget season.

BOB HAAS, MANAGER OF the newly-opened Park Valley Pool in Hillsborough (photo this page) claims that a swimmer would get a purer swig of water out of the swimming pool than he would from a regular drinking fountain there. While the water in the 120,000-gallon pool is to be changed only about once a year, it's completely purified every 24 hours in a constantly working series of special process earth filters. The water is sampled and checked several times daily, too, he noted.

DAMAGE ESTIMATED AT BETWEEN \$1,500 and \$2,000 was wrought on state highway road maintenance equipment left Tuesday night on N. C. Highway 86 just north of Chapel Hill. The senseless and wanton damage included broken headlights, wires jerked loose from engine moorings, dirt in gas tanks, and air let out of vehicle tires.

And a local businessman has been given permission to plant flowers and greenery along the three-foot dirt strip atop the wall, subject to approval of the Town Manager.
