SOME FAR EAST NEWS.

Koreans Aid the Japanese—Japs are in Want of Necessaries.

St. Petersburg, July 3.—Lieutenant, General Sakharoff, under date of July 2nd, reports minor outpost affairs and reconnaissances in the neighborhood of Siakhotau.

General Sakharoff believes that dysentery is very prevalent among the Japanese troops.

On June 27th the Russian fire destroyed two Japanese guns and a caisson.

There are fresh indications of Japanese advance near Siakhotau. According to report, Russian scouts have ascertained that a number of Korean soldiers are assisting the Japanese.

Japanese Lack Necessaries.

London, July 3.—The Central News has received the following dispatch from Fa Tehe Kiamo, under date of July 3rd:

The weather is dry, but the Japanese are taking no action.

The Chinese state that the Japanese lack victuals, medicines and forage East of Kai Chau, the principal Japanese forces have fallen back, abandoning their positions. There have been no notable changes on the road to Liao Yang.

Two Russian Vessels Sunk.

Washington, July 3.—The Japanese legation has received the following cablegram from Tokio: "Admiral Togo reports that on the night of June 27th the twelfth torpedo boat flotilla attacked and sank the enemy's guardship with two masts and three funnels outside Port Arthur. The same flotilla then exchanged fire with the enemy's destroyers, one of which was observed to capsiz and sink. Our casualties were 14 dead and three wounded."

The Day we Celebrate, at Least Some of Us Do, Others Do Not.

The 'Glorious Fourth.'

The day we celebrate, at least in spots, for glorious or inglorious, the Fourth does not get much attention in Concord where the average citizen works through the hot day regardless of sentiment. 'Tis, however, the 4th with all that the day means and in many localities a day of fireworks and accidents.

Spencer has a celebration today. Hon. R. B. Glenn, candidate for governor speaks there, while the celebration will be extensive.

At Dobson, Surry county, Messrs. Spencer Blackburn and R. N. Hackett speak at a 4th of July rally.

In Concord there has been very little to remind us that it is a national holiday. The postoffice has been closed and the banks observe the day. At the Southern station the freight office has been closed, but the fireworks and patriotic outbursts are absent.

Mail Clerk Killed.

Tony, Wis., July 2.—Mail Clerk Dannison and two unidentified tramps were killed in an head-on collision between the passenger train and freight early this morning. Lynch, another mail clerk, was badly injured. Engineer Doolittle was pinned under the engine and it is not known how serious his injuries are.

DEATH OF W. A. WOOD.

Prominent Citizen of the City Died This Morning at 3:20 O'clock—Burial This Afternoon.

After an illness of several months Mr. W. A. Wood died this morning at 3:20 o'clock at his home on north Union street. His illness covered a period of several months, a complication of diseases followed a fever and for several months the patient lingered, underwent several operations and spent weeks at the hospital. Mr. Wood was in his 46th year. He was born in Randolph county and had lived in Concord for near 20 years. A wife and one child, a small son, survive.

W. A. Wood, "Bud" Wood as his friends knew him, was one of the most popular men in Concord. He was liked by everybody and a favorite among his friends, possessed many fine, noble traits of character and was ever a splendid citizen. He was a member of the Methodist church and of the Knights of Pythias.

Mr. Wood since living in Concord had been connected with the Odell mills, where he was an overseer of one of the departments. His long service with the mills, his personal popularity and faithful attention to duty made him one of the most valuable men in the company's employment.

His death causes universal sorrow among those who knew him and everyone liked the kind, genial spirit of the man. He was a man who in many circles will be missed.

The funeral services will be conducted this afternoon at 5 o'clock by Rev. G. T. Rowe, pastor of the Forest Hill Methodist church to which deceased belonged. The interment will be at the cemetery.
