TROLLY LINES.

The development of the Catawba river power bids fair to lead to an early establishment of a trolly line connecting the towns of this section. Answer to Chanler.

New York, Nov. 29.-Thomas F. appointed committee of the person and estate of John Armstrong Chanler, former husband of Amelie Rivers, the authoress, today filed an answer to the complaint, which Mr. Chanler entered in the United States Circuit Court here to have Mr. Sherman's appointment declared null and void. The appointment complained of was made by the Supreme Court on the ground that Mr. Chanler was mentally incompetent to manage his own affairs. He was placed in the Bloomingdale Asylum, from which institution he escaped in June, 1899. An action was then commenced in Virginia, where Mr Chanler claims a residence, to determine the question of his insanity. He succeeded in proving that he was competent to manage his own affairs and was adjudged sane by the courts.

In his answer, Mr. Sherman denies that Mr. Chanler has ever been denied access to the papers relating to the estate. He further represents that Mr. Chanler was and is a citizen of the town of Rye, in this State, and not a resident of Virginia, as claimed, and that because of such residence, the Federal Courts are without jurisdiction in the matter. Mr. Sherman also claims that the commitment of Mr. Chanler to the asylum was regular and proper, and that he was then and is

Woman Causes Big Sensation.

New York, Nov. 28.-A sensation has been caused here by the bringing a suit by Herbert D. Newton, of Brooklyn, Mass., against Mrs. Cassie Chadwick, of Cleveland, Ohio, for \$190,000, for money loaned. Mrs. Chadwick is the wife of a Cleveland

In addition to Mr. Newton's suit several banks have taken legal action to recover various amounts which will ring the total sum to \$267,800.

Mr. Newton alleged that Mrs. Chadwick told him she had \$5,000,000 in bonds and secur ties, held in trust by Ira Reyolds, secretary and treasurer of the Wade Park Bank Company, of Cleveland, Ohio, and she had notes for \$500,000, which she could negotiate at any time, for the purpose of paying Newton. He loaned her \$190,000.

Concerning the action against Mrs. Chadwick, he says the suit has been brought in the common pleas court at Cleveland to recover upon loans made to Mrs. Chadwick, for which the promised payments had not been made when due.
